

KLAMATH UNIT SHIPS CLOTHES FOR EUROPEANS

Mrs. C. E. Dennis, production chairman of the Klamath county chapter of the American Red Cross, announced today a shipment went out Thursday to the American Red Cross warehouse in New Jersey. Most of these garments are to be used for the relief of civilian war sufferers in England.

The shipment contained 40 pair men's socks, 15 crocheted shawls, 10 knitted mufflers, 10 men's sweaters, 45 children's sweaters, 24 layettes, 4 children's dresses, 10 women's dresses, 15 boys' shirts.

Mrs. Dennis wishes to thank her committee and all of the volunteer workers who have worked diligently on these garments. The committee is composed of Mrs. A. J. Lyle, chairman of layettes, Mrs. Marshall Farmer, chairman of knitting, and Mrs. Leslie Rogers, chairman of cutting.

Sewing and knitting units are organized all over the county and Mrs. Dennis states there are now about 420 women volunteering their services to this program. New quotas are assigned to each chapter about every three months, with each quota larger than the preceding one. The materials are purchased by the government for this purpose and have been speedily made into warm garments, most of which are already in service in Great Britain as evidence of friendship and sympathy from the women of this country to the suffering women of Europe.

School Blackboard Trust Probed By Justice Department

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31 (AP)—Eighteen firms which control a major part of the state used for the nation's school purposes, were called upon today to answer federal charges that they conspired to fix prices in violation of the anti-trust laws.

The companies—all in eastern Pennsylvania—and an equal number of individuals were indicted yesterday as a result of a department of justice investigation into the cost of school supplies.

Allen A. Doherty, special assistant attorney general, who conducted the inquiry, said it was "one phase of a general investigation of the school supplies industry."

He added that the government also was scanning another branch of the industry—the equipment of college and university laboratories with furniture, crayons, chalk, composition blackboards, maps and globes.

Indictments in a third branch of the industry—that of school furnishings and equipment—were returned in Richmond, Va., Doherty said. Six firms and 39 individuals pleaded no defense there, he said, and were fined \$28,000.

Doherty declared that the eastern Pennsylvania group not only controlled production of state used for school purposes but also state used in building and other commercial work.

The indictments accused the 18 state firms of creating "arbitrary and artificial" prices and "unlawful combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and commerce."

Willkie Samples Common People's Ideas in Britain

LONDON, Jan. 31 (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie had his way Thursday, paying an unescorted call on London's off-quoted man-in-the-street and man-in-the-pub, drinking and talking with the "boys" and playing cards—the last with a losing score.

The American visitor jammed considerable of London into his tour. He is curtailing his visit, starting for home next week.

He said he would be "delighted" to appear before the United States senate committee hearing on the aid-to-Britain bill when he was told that Senator Nye, isolationist leader, had said Willkie should be heard.

At one place Willkie visited, the Public House (saloon) proprietor, Harry Phillips, watched Willkie play darts with a leading laborer and, in celebration of the occasion, broke out a bottle of 1929 champagne.

The man easily defeated Willkie who commented: "This guy's too good."

Then the champagne was produced. "I was going to keep this for armistice day," the pub proprietor said. "But you are as good as armistice day and we'll open the bottle together."

The dart-throwing laborer stood by, almost unable to comprehend his victory. "Blimey! I'm going all international," he said.

At the first place visited, also a pub, Willkie was readily recognized by a group of soldiers and other customers. The proprietor invited him behind the bar.

Macaroni Ideal Addition To Extend Meat Portions

To make a little meat go much farther, combine it with some form of macaroni or noodles. Well seasoned sauce is an important part of this nutritious extension. Tomatoes, onions, green pepper, kitchen herbs and spices are important. A small can of mushrooms costs little and does wonders. Buy the canned stems and pieces for sauce, rather than caps. They are cheaper and just as flavorful as the perfect caps which are more useful for garnishing.

For the following recipe, drain a can of mushroom stems and pieces, saute the mushrooms lightly in butter before using. Any mushroom, either fresh or canned, is improved in flavor when sauteed before cooking.

Broiled Pork Chops With Macaroni and Tomato Sauce (Serves 4 to 6)

Three-quarter pound elbow macaroni, 6 rib pork chops, 1 No. 24 can tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste, 1 cup chopped onion, 1 cup chopped, canned mushroom stems and pieces, 1 cup chopped green pepper.

Pan broil the chops until well browned. Add the can of tomatoes and the mushroom liquor. When it comes to a boil, cut fire low and add the uncooked macaroni, onion, mushroom pieces and green pepper. Season to taste, cover tightly and simmer

Broiled Hamburger Steak With Spaghetti

Three-quarter pound spaghetti, 1 1/2 pounds hamburger, 1 sweet Spanish-type onion, 2 table-spoons butter, 4 medium tomatoes or 1 No. 1 can tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste.

Cook the spaghetti in boiling water, salted, until tender.

Menu

BREAKFAST: Sliced bananas and dates, cornmeal griddle cakes, syrup, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Hot bacon rolls, fruit salad, cheese, fig cookies, tea, milk.

DINNER: Broiled hamburger steaks with spaghetti and sauce, buttered cauliflower, orange snow pudding, custard sauce, coffee, milk.

Drain and place in pan beneath broiling rack. On the broiling rack place the hamburgers, shaped into equal patties. Broil the meat slowly. When it is nearly finished, place on the rack the onion, sliced; the tomatoes, cut in halves. Add a little salt and butter on top of each and broil while meat completes cooking. The juices from the

meat and vegetables drip below and season the spaghetti. If fresh tomatoes are not available, pour the can of tomatoes over the spaghetti at the beginning of the broiling process and it will season the spaghetti and heat through while the meat and onions are broiling.

TACOMA SEES END OF SEATTLE ROW

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 31 (UP)—Mayor Harry P. Cain of Tacoma Thursday told the Seattle chamber of commerce that it was time to forget city rivalries and instead develop "this great empire of ours in the Pacific northwest."

The 35-year-old Tacoma executive said the traditional rivalry between Seattle and Tacoma cost the two cities millions of dollars. "The new Tacoma spirit will be to pass on to Seattle any prospective new enterprises that would be less suitable for Tacoma," Mayor Cain declared.

IT'S THE BOG

SPOKANE, Wash., (AP)—Answering a hurry call, two patrolmen took a short cut. Their car hit a mudhole and sank to its hub caps.

A second patrol car went to the rescue. It bogged down. So did a third. A city truck went to pull the three cars out but sank behind them.

Finally, as the city's largest truck succeeded in pulling out the four cars, headquarters broadcast that the hurry call was a false alarm.

NO BOTTLENECK, STEEL MAN SAYS

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (UP)—Bethlehem Steel corporation tonight reported record earnings for 1940 and disclosed that although its plants have been operating at full blast for the past four months, the company still holds an unprecedented backlog of more than \$1,200,000,000.

Eugene G. Grace, president, admitted new orders at present are outstripping production but denied there is any steel bottleneck in Bethlehem plants.

He said \$1,036,100,000 of the current backlog represents ship construction and repairs, leaving a relatively small amount for all other types of business, including steel for export, for domestic needs and for defense work.

Grace supported the stand taken last night by U. S. Steel Chairman Irving S. Oids that there is no danger of a steel shortage in this country, contending that the steel industry now has three to four times the capacity needed for defense work.

Consolidated net income of the corporation and its subsidiaries for 1940 was reported at a new record high of \$48,677,254 or \$14.04 a common share, compared with \$24,638,384 or \$5.75 a share in 1939.

Mexico, U. S. to Settle Troubles By New Paper

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 31 (AP)—Ambassador Francisco Castillo Najera sped home from Washington by plane today for conferences which informed sources said were preparatory to signing an agreement settling all outstanding issues between Mexico and the United States.

The ambassador was summoned to confer with President Manuel Avila Camacho following conversations with United States Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles regarding settlement of claims arising from Mexican expropriation of lands owned by

United States citizens. He talked with Welles before his hurried departure from Washington last night.

(In Washington, the conversations between Castillo Najera and Welles were understood to have covered proposals for a mutual defense system similar to that between the United States and Canada.)

(Whether any contemplated agreement would involve settlement of claims by United States oil companies for properties expropriated by Mexico in 1938 was not disclosed either in Mexico City or Washington.)

Since 1927 Mexico has expropriated 5,000,000 acres of American-owned land—an issue that has been handled apart from the oil expropriation.
