CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 31 (AP)—Oregon State college, smack up against the Coast conference's northern division basketball tradition that four defeats preclude a championship, Friday awaited the Washington series with a "we win, or else" attitude.

The Beavers already have lost three games—two of them last week to these same Huskies in Seattle.

Coach Slat Gill, expected to revert to OSC's habitual zone defense and slow ball tactics in an effort to hobble the Washington speedsters and make them shoot from afar, indicated he would start Mulder, Dement, Mandie, Valenti and Durand. Durand is a sophomore, the others juniors.

Tonight's game opens at 7:30 o'clock, Saturday night's at 8:15.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31 (AP)—Basketball competition in the southern division of the coast conference gets in full stride tonight, with Stanford meeting U. C. L. A. in Los Angeles, and California facing Southern California in Berkeley.

Hall Scores 8th Victory

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (AP)—Champion Willie Hoppe still is the man to beat for 1941 world three cushion tournament honors, billiard experts opine, but a few more demonstrations by Allen Hall of Chicago may change their minds.

Hall, three times runner-up in world meets and undefeated in the current \$20,000 event, scored his eighth straight victory Thursday night. It was the way he did it, however, that set observers to making mental reservations on their No. 1 choice.

The Chicagoan reeled off 43 billiards in 20 innings and needed seven more in two innings to break the existing world best game mark. He faltered, but after four scoreless innings, put together four points and two frames later three more to overwhelm Earl Lookabaugh, Chicago, 50 to 21 in 27 innings.

Although four innings over the world mark of 23 held jointly by Jay Bozeman of Vallejo, Calif., and Johnny Layton, of Sedalia, Mo., his effort was the best so far in the 1941 meet. The previous best game was 32 innings, set by Welker Cochran of San Francisco and equaled by Hoppe in his belated tournament debut.

Hoppe last night encountered considerable difficulty with the ivories and with 26-year-old Irving Crane as well. The Livonia, N. Y., shotmaker kept on virtually even terms with Hoppe for 36 innings before the defending champion gradually increased his lead and won in 54 frames, 50 to 26.

Vic Townsend Tops Division Scoring Race

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 31 (AP)—Although his team is in last place in the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball race, Little Vic Townsend, Oregon guard, is leading in the race for individual scoring honors.

Townsend has connected with 25 field goals and 24 free-throws for a total of 74 points, the Oregon Athletic News bureau revealed.

Paul Lindeman, burly six-foot, seven-inch Washington State college center, is in second place with 71 points.

Another University of Oregon player, "Porky" Andrews, is third with 61, followed by Otis Hilton, giant Idaho pivot man, with 60.

UNION CREEK, ORE.—Chains advised from Union creek to Crater lake. Twelve inches snow with unbreakable common crust. Skiing poor.

Bly's Townies, sparked by Forward Ray Crane and Guard Bud Patzke, upset the fast-rising Weyerhaeuser hoopsters last night at the Klamath army court, 32-28, in the second game of a three-way billing that also saw First National Bank cagers trip Lost River Dairy, 37-32, in the opener and Midland swamp the hapless DeMolay club in the finale, 32-17.

Weyerhaeuser, a team that pulled a surprise Monday night in overcoming the previously undefeated Knights of Columbus five, 24-20, was expected to have a comparatively easy time with Bly. But the Townies had different ideas, and after posting a 18-15 lead at the half went on to the four-point victory thanks to Crane and Patzke, both of whom marked up six points in the final session.

First National opened impressively against the Dairy and ran up a 20-0 lead over their bewildered rivals during the first 11 minutes of play. At the intermission the bankers were out front, 22-8 and never were seriously threatened by the Dairy five that last week upset the Ricky Jewelry contingent, 29-23.

"Smoky" Stover led the First National offense with 14 points followed by Harold Eittrheim of the Lost River quint who garnered 10 tallies.

Midland snapped out of a two-game losing streak and trimmed the cellarite DeMolay team, 35-17, in a Church league encounter that wound up the evening's program. The game marked the eighth consecutive loss for the DeMolays and gave the Midlanders an even break in eight games.
