

LUMBER IN 'DOGHOUSE' CHIEF SAYS

TACOMA, Feb. 1 (AP)—Asserting that "the lumber industry is in the 'doghouse,'" President Corydon Wagner of Tacoma told West Coast Lumbermen's association stockholders here Friday morning that "the challenge of 1941 is to return the industry to its proper place in the esteem of the American people."

Several hundred Pacific northwest lumbermen, gathered for the association's meeting, were reminded by Mr. Wagner that Paul Bunyan, not Caspar Milquetoast, is their patron saint. He urged them to face their public relations and trade problems in 1941 with traditional enterprise, courage and perseverance.

The attack directed against the lumber industry, Mr. Wagner said is "part of a general attack on all business, and to discredit private enterprise, and secondly, is more virulent because of the opportunity to play up existing prejudices, which lumbermen never have taken the trouble to allay."

Answering charges of profiteering by lumbermen, Mr. Wagner said that "Our industry records and the income tax statistics released by the U. S. treasury department clearly indicate that the Pacific northwest lumber industry can be more successfully attacked for failure to earn a return sufficient to maintain its stability and thus insure the carrying out of its increased social and economic responsibilities than on the score of profiteering."

The rapid advances in price of certain items last fall were abrupt and gave excuse for suspicion and criticism. However, the fact that the base from which the advance came was below cost, or the part played in the advance by the holler-skelter manner of buying the first defense requirements, conveniently escapes attention of the critics."

PARK GETS SNOW; MORE PREDICTED

Snow is forecast throughout the Klamath basin for the weekend and in a morning radio report from Crater Lake national park snow was falling leaving a new coat of 2.7 inches and bringing the depth at headquarters to 118 inches. Calves: For five days, salable 40. Mostly strong; few vealers \$12.50-75; slaughter calves \$10.00-11.00.

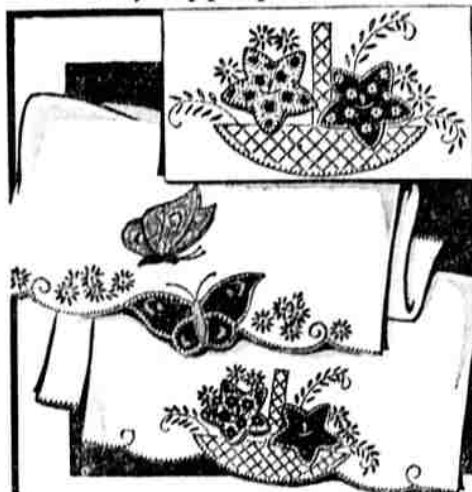

JANUARY WEATHER CLEAVES TO TYPE
January was a typical mid-winter month with the weather going from a minimum of 19 degrees on the first two days of the month, to a maximum of 52 degrees on the last day.

Those who shivered during January are advised by the U. S. weatherman that it was 5.7 degrees above the normal temperature. The mean maximum was 40.6 degrees; mean minimum, 28.2; mean, 34.4.

Precipitation was 2.50 inches for the entire month, or .59 inches above average. There were 10 clear days, two part cloudy, and 19 cloudy days during January.

RUBINOFF OWNER OF STRADIVARIUS

One of the most precious instruments in the world, a Stradivarius violin, which is insured for \$100,000 is owned by Dave Rubinoff who plays in concert here Sunday afternoon, February 9.

Satisfying a life-long ambition, Rubinoff acquired the "Strad" after searching for several years. He had tested many old and valuable violins, placed at his disposal by music dealers and collectors, but none were just right. The Romanoff-Stradivarius, as it is known, sent him into raptures.

Made in 1731 by Antonio Stradivari in Cremona, Italy, the instrument in time passed into the hands of Romanoffs, the reigning family of Russia until the revolution. It disappeared during that time of stress but turned up later in Paris in the possession of a former Russian prince who had taken the valuable instrument with him when he fled from the country.

The violin bears the elaborately engraved and bejeweled coat of arms of the Romanoff family as well as the identification mark of Stradivari and the date. The instrument is of a deep brownish-red luster, perfectly formed, and developed in all its intricate detail in a manner representative of the best work of the master.

The Rubinoff concert is sponsored by the Klamath Falls Lions club with proceeds to go into the sight conservation fund maintained by the organization.

BUILDING QUIET IN MONTH OF JANUARY

January, 1941, was one of the quietest building months seen in Klamath Falls for quite some time observed City Building Inspector Harold Franey who reported a total of 16 permits issued during the month at a total of \$26,965. Figures for January, 1940, were 31 permits totaling \$49,825, and for the preceding month of December, 1940, 25 permits totaling \$68,275.

Following is the report: new residences, 4, \$11,500; remodeled residences, 6, \$1315; new business houses, 2, \$5500; remodeled business houses, 1, \$300; garages, private, 2, \$350; rooming houses, 1, \$8000; total, 16 permits, \$26,965.
