

Richard Crooks To Sing February 14th

Famous Metropolitan Opera Star To Open 1941 Winter Season at Pelican Theatre Here

A musical season of rare treat is in store for Klamath Falls patrons and no other than Richard Crooks, leading tenor of the Metropolitan Opera company, will open the series presented for the winter of 1941 by the Klamath Basin Cooperative association. Mr. Crooks will sing at the Pelican theatre on Friday night, February the fourteenth.

To those who have not had the good fortune to hear and see Richard Crooks in the flesh, his voice on the radio has become a well-beloved legend. An American singer of universal renown, Richard Crooks is preeminent in many fields. One of the foremost artists on the concert platform, he holds a position unchallenged on the operatic stage. Millions of radio listeners are his devoted followers, thousands of his records are sold in every quarter of the globe. His world tours have established him with similar popularity in Australasia, South Africa, and most of the European countries. Crooks' interpretative powers are as versatile as they are brilliant, the splendor of his voice lending itself uniformly well to songs, opera, ballads, or religious music.

The story of Richard Crooks is typically American in its elements of struggle and perseverance, adventure, and early and spectacular success. As a boy soprano in his native Trenton, New Jersey, Crooks first triumphed at the age of ten when he sang at an important music festival. Throughout his early youth he worked hard to provide himself with means for the serious study of voice. Although he was under age when the United States entered the World war, he joined the 626th Aero Squadron. It was not until after demobilization that his real career began. Coming to New York, he was an immediate sensation in concert, recital, and as soloist with orchestra, and his subsequent transcontinental concert tours each year have held record numbers of unusually successful engagements.

"What Price Peace," will be the subject of discussion at the Business and Professional Women's club dinner meeting, Monday, February the third.

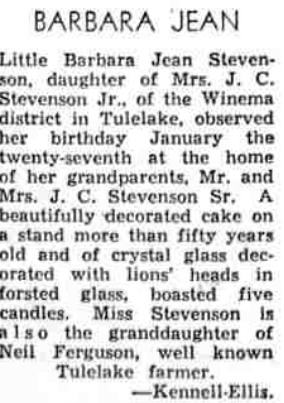

League of Women Voters To Discuss Legislation

The two study groups of the League of Women Voters, Government and its Operation, and Government and Economic Welfare will meet together at the chamber of commerce on Monday, February the third, at two o'clock. They will continue their study of the merit system and the unemployment compensation law, stressing the amendments to the latter which have come up in the legislature since the league's last general meeting on January the twentieth, at which time interesting discussions were given on this law by two local men.

While the subject of this unemployment compensation law does not have the dramatic appeal that the war and our foreign policy commands, the study of this legislation may be more important to the preservation of democracy and our American way of life than anything we could do in the study of our foreign relations inasmuch as the war and our foreign study is set upon a path that will have to fall through and there is little that we can do to change it at this juncture.
