

NOTED BRITISH SPEAKERS TO APPEAR HERE

Sunday at the First Presbyterian church, the Rev. F. John Scroggie, D. D., of London, England, is to appear for the first time and will speak at the morning service. This is the beginning of a series of meetings to continue each afternoon and evening through Friday, February 14. Announcements with reference to topics will be made later.

In this connection is a fine spirit of brotherly cooperation manifested by the First Methodist church. Led by their pastor, the Rev. Victor Phillips, the First Methodist congregation is to dismiss its service and unite with the Presbyterians in the evening service at 7:30 o'clock. It is interesting to note that Dr. Phillips is a native of England, being born not far from Manchester in Birnley, Lancashire county. He will preside at the evening service and welcome to Klamath Falls the distinguished divine.

Dr. Scroggie is now in California, holding services in the Glendale Memorial church of San Francisco. He will arrive in Klamath Falls on the evening train at 9:30 o'clock Saturday, Mrs. Scroggie, who is known all over the British Isles as a speaker, will complete her engagement in San Francisco, and will arrive at Klamath Falls on the evening train Monday. Dr. Scroggie has had a varied as well as a distinguished career. As a young man, with a remarkable voice, he took training for the operatic stage. He will be asked to sing during his stay here. Later he was diverted to the business world, entering Barclay's bank in London, as junior clerk where he speedily rose to the presidency. At still a later time, probably through the influence of his brother, the Rev. W. Graham Scroggie, D. D., world-famous as a Bible expositor, he entered the ministry in which calling he has occupied several outstanding pulpits in England.

Mrs. Scroggie has an even more outstanding career. She is an ex-president of both the National Free Church Women's council and the Women's League of England, and is free to conduct campaigns either in connection with Dr. Scroggie or in her own right. She will be available for meetings of women's organizations and those of a more general type, provided such will not interfere with the main meetings at the First Presbyterian church. It is hoped that arrangements may be made for her to speak over the local radio station.

The women of the First Presbyterian church have planned a tea in honor of Mrs. Scroggie, to be held in the dining rooms of the church on Tuesday, February 11, at 2:30 o'clock. Mrs. R. C. Groesbeck is in charge of the tea and Mrs. Theodore Smith will head the receiving line. The women of the various churches tested, are most cordially invited to the city, as well as others invited to hear Mrs. Scroggie when she will speak on "The British Women in the Crisis."

Dr. Scroggie describes his own preaching as "evangelical, expository and prophetic."

Definite arrangements have been made for the Scroggies to appear before the Kiwanis club Thursday, February 13, at noon in the Willard hotel.

During their sojourn here of five days the Scroggies will be in the meanwhile, if organized of the city wish to avail themselves of their services, they should contact Theodore Smith, the pastor of the First Presbyterian church.

FEDERAL RESERVE BANK GOES AHEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5 (UP)—Spurred by the national defense program, business activity in the twelfth federal reserve district surged ahead in the summer and fall of 1940, the Federal Reserve bank reported Tuesday in its year-end business review.

Construction and related industries first felt the effects of defense program building late in May, the review said, as the army and navy began huge construction projects.

The aircraft and shipbuilding industries also showed marked expansion as facilities were enlarged to meet defense orders.

Increased employment, an extension of the work week, and a small increase in average wage rates during the year were reflected in a rise in factory payrolls in California, Washington and Oregon to the highest level on record late in 1940.

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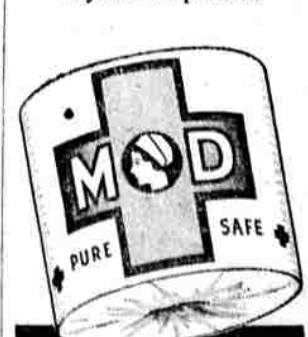


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PROSPECTOR FRIEND OF LATE SENATOR PITTMAN DIES

GLENDAL, Calif., Feb. 5 (UP)—Patrick J. Sullivan, who shared a prospector's shack with the late Senator Key Pittman

of Nevada during the Alaskan gold rush, Tuesday hanged himself from a raft in a rest home because of ill health, police reported.

The 78-year-old former prospector is credited with having been the first to discover gold on the beach at Nome, Alaska,

and thereafter the beach ore was called "Irishman's gold" because of Sullivan.

After taking out \$30,000 in gold from Alaska, Sullivan went to Los Vegas, Nev., in 1905, and with the money he made mining he established a contracting business which made

him wealthy as the Nevada town grew.
