URBAN ACCIDENTS HIGH IN DECEMBER

December was the only month in 1940 in which urban fatal accidents exceeded rural fatal accidents, it was disclosed here today by Earl Snell, secretary of state who announced that 55 per cent of the crashes resulting in deaths took place inside city limits during the month.

In the month of January, 1940, there were the same number of fatal accidents in urban and rural areas, but in every other month, the rural fatalities exceeded the urban fatal crashes. Greater concentration of traffic in urban areas during the holiday shopping season was believed responsible for the heavier volume of fatalities in cities during December.

December was the only month of the year that recorded more fatal accidents in business areas of cities than in any other area. There were 12 fatal accidents in business districts compared to nine on major highways. In most months, the major highways see most of the fatal accidents.

With 13 pedestrians killed during the month, this type of accident took 30 per cent of the lives lost in the state through traffic accidents in December. Seven of the 13 pedestrians were over 55 years of age and seven of them were committing some unsafe action at the time they were hit.

There were 633 persons injured in accidents during the month, a decrease of 12 per cent from the toll of 718 persons hurt during the same month in 1939.

PORTLAND POTATO SURVEY CONDUCTED

A potato survey which the state department of agriculture is now conducting in the Portland retail channels will be the basis for gathering information which will be of benefit to growers, shippers, retailers and consumers, reports Frank McKennon, chief of the department's plant division.

Among factors which the survey will seek to determine are damage and deterioration in transit, types of containers, damage in retail stores, consumer preference as to size and other items.

Retail stores were chosen for the survey because here is best reflected the reaction of the housewife who buys the bulk of the potatoes. Nearly 10,000 cars of potatoes are inspected and certified annually now by the federal-state shipping point service in Oregon.

CUTTING OF COWS' TAILS ILLEGAL

Is it legal to cut off a cow's tail? And how about plucking live geese?

These two humane-angle queries were directed to Dr. W. H. Lytle of the animal division of the state department of agriculture, whose answer in each instance was "no."

A farmer in one section of the state was reported to be docking the tails of his cows, leaving them about a foot long. Presumably the tails were a nuisance at milking time.

Dr. Lytle pointed out that there is a law which makes it illegal to mutilate animals. A jail sentence and/or fine up to \$100 is the legal penalty. This same law exempts, however, the docking of cattle or the docking of horses or sheep as practiced by stockmen.

On the premises that geese are animals, this same law would make illegal plucking of live geese.

UNIONS PETITION AT WEYERHAEUSER

Hearings by examiner Patrick Walker of the national labor relations board on several petitions of various labor organizations that are asking to be certified as units for collective bargaining at the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Klamath Falls branch, are scheduled to commence at the court house, Thursday, February 6, at 10 a. m.

Among the petitioning organizations are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, which petitions to designate all locomotive engineers, firemen and hostlers, employees of the company, as a separate unit; The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, petitioning to designate all conductors and brakemen, employees of the company, as a separate unit; and the International Association of Machinists, petitioning to have the machine shop and car repairmen, employees of the company, designated as a separate bargaining unit.

The three petitions have been consolidated. The hearing will probably extend over at least two days. The International Woodworkers of America, CIO, and the Sawmill and Timber Workers union, AFL, each contending for a one unit representation of all the company employees, will be represented at the hearing.
