Maximum temperature Thursday was 38 degrees, but the thermometer had a low of 11 degrees during early Friday morning hours. It was 21 degrees at 8 a. m. A light southeast wind was blowing and visibility was fair due to clouds. Snow depth at headquarters was given at 116 inches, with 3.2 inches of new snow. Roads were open, a bit slippery, and chains are not required but advised carried.

NEW BRIDE TAKES JAIL SENTENCE ON SPEEDING CHARGE

SEATTLE, Feb. 7 (AP)—Mrs. Norman Bell McElroy, bride of three months, was convicted in police court of speeding and fined \$15.

With her jaw set, the 26-year-old bride announced that she would serve out the fine in jail. "I have the money," she said, "but it really isn't mine—it's money my husband gave me for groceries. I broke the law. My husband said I should be punished for what I did."

She began serving the three-day sentence yesterday afternoon. At 8 p. m., Acting Police Judge Charles F. Smith released her, ordered the remainder of the fine suspended.

"I think," he said, "she has probably learned her lesson."

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SENATORS TO GIVE AID ON SPRAGUE ROAD

A pledge of cooperation in attempting to get federal assistance for construction of the Sprague River road was received by the county court Friday from Senator Holman and Senator McNary.

Holman said he had received the county court's brief in support of the request for road work and would use it "to the best possible advantage when the interior department bill is before the senate appropriation committee."

Holman is a member of the sub-committee handling that bill. "I sincerely hope," he wrote, "that I will be able to secure an increase in the appropriation for Indian roads which will permit the improvement of the road."

McNary said he had discussed the Sprague River road question with the assistant commissioner of Indian affairs and would keep in close touch with the situation.

The Klamath county chamber of commerce has participated in the effort to bring about construction of this road and Secretary Earl Reynolds, on his recent visit to Washington, conferred with congressional delegates and others in connection with it.
