

WATER FIGHT THREAT CALLS DENVER MEET

DENVER, Feb. 7 (AP)—A threatened fight over water rights—State vs. National—called men from all sections of the west today into a conference mapped by Colorado's republican governor, already accused of attempting "to declare a state of civil war."

Bushy-haired Ralph L. Carr, in asking 16 western governors and their advisers to meet in his chambers in the golden-domed state house, sharply opposes water legislation which has the national administration's blessing.

This is the proposed Arkansas valley authority, patterned after the Tennessee valley authority. It would embrace a territory seven times the area of the Tennessee valley—the basins of the Arkansas, White, St. Francis and Red rivers.

Representative Ellis of Arkansas—author of the "civil war" charge against the Colorado governor—said the A.V.A. bill was "drafted at the direction of President Roosevelt."

He argued the A.V.A. would mean better flood and drought control in the stream basins, and cheaper electric power for the basin states.

But Carr contended the authority "would upset the 75-year administration of water in this section."

"Until now a water decree has been sacred in all courts, state and federal," he said. "It will not be if this bill passes. We must fight it."

He said he hopes the conference, in sessions beginning at 10 a. m., Mountain Standard time, would outline an alternate plan of water and flood control to replace the suggested A.V.A.

The conferences also have been asked to study what effect on western streams will be exerted by a recent United States supreme court decree that any stream drawing two feet of water is navigable and subject to federal control.

Colorado's democratic junior senator, big Ed C. Johnson, has attacked the conference from Washington and flayed Carr as the "front and spokesman" for private power interests.

AIREDALE FLIES TO MASTER AT MILITARY CAMP

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7 (UP)—A ten-year-old airedale dog who is pining away for his master, was en route by plane today for Fort Ord, Calif., where Pvt. Everett Scott anxiously awaits him.

The dog, Laddie, was taken from Scott's home in Chanute, Kas., and placed aboard a TWA airliner after army authorities approved efforts to reunite Scott and his pet, parted four months ago when Scott joined the army. Since then Laddie has refused nourishment.

The Salinas Index-Journal suggested arrangements be made to fly Laddie to Ford Ord and airlines agreed. TWA's flight west must be halted at Albuquerque because of bad flying conditions, but after a lay-over, during which time Laddie will be given proper attention, TWA will bring him to San Francisco, reaching here at 7:13 p. m. today.

Scott was refused permission to go to San Francisco to meet his pal, so United Airlines will fly the dog to Del Monte, a few miles from Fort Ord, Saturday morning.

Publisher Favors Grabbing British, French Islands 'By Force' to Bar Germans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Col. Robert R. McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune, testified Thursday he favored occupying British and French island possessions "by force" if that were necessary to prevent Germany from using them as bases for an attack on the United States.

McCormick appeared before the senate foreign relations committee on the administration's British aid bill, but said he did not wish to express an opinion on the legislation itself. After the witness had declared it was "fantastic" to believe the United States could be invaded, Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) asked: "Suppose Germany should conquer Great Britain and take over British bases in this hemisphere?"

"I wouldn't let them do it," McCormick replied. To prevent such a step, McCormick declared, he would seek first to acquire the island possessions in advance but that if this was impossible he would occupy them "by force."

"What do you think the effect would be on Hitler?" Pepper asked.

"I couldn't tell you," McCormick answered. "I am not interested in that."

Pepper asked what McCormick would do if "Hitler sought to take over the Azores."

"I'd get there first," the witness answered.

In saying it was "fantastic" to suggest an invasion McCormick mentioned formidable distances, transportation difficulties, and other barriers for any would-be invader.

Senator Pepper asked McCormick whether he favored the policy of "sending our navy there first" if American security were threatened in any part of the world, and the witness agreed.

CALIFORNIA UPPS DRAFT TO 12,011

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 7 (AP)—The state selective service increased the California quota to 12,011 men Thursday in assigning delivery dates to the 284 local boards for the third draft.

The total state delivery as previously announced was for 11,662 registrants but the draft headquarters included in the revised quota replacements for induction failures or rejections of the second call.

An explanatory statement accompanying the schedule of arrivals at the four induction stations said "If the local board's third call is for twenty men but it had five rejections and failed to deliver five men on the second call, it will be required to furnish 30 men to meet the third call."

The general induction period will extend from February 17 to March 14.

The official schedule for the delivery of registrants by local boards includes:

February 19—Crescent City, local board 1, 8 men, assigned to the San Francisco induction station.

March 14—Yreka, local board 2, 35 men; Alturas, local board 4, 14 men, all assigned to the Sacramento induction station.

Apples Yield Cheap Dessert For Any Meal

Apples make high-tasting, low-cost desserts in winter. Let's go into that subject. Here's a recipe for a cake to be served hot for dinner or for the afternoon tea meeting of your local defense club.

APPLE CAKE
Two and one-half cups sifted cake flour, 1½ teaspoons combination baking powder, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, ½ cups cold shortening, about 1½ cup cold water, 1 cup sugar, 1½ teaspoons cinnamon, 6 large apples, pared and cut in eighths.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and sugar, and sift again. Cut in shortening until pieces are about the size of small peas. Add water, a small amount at a time, mixing lightly with fork. Handle as little as possible. Wrap in waxed paper and chill thoroughly before rolling.

Roll ¼ inch thick on floured board. Line three 8 by 8 by 2-inch pans with pastry, allowing pastry to extend 1 inch up sides of pans. Combine sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle 2 tablespoons of sugar mixture over pastry in each pan. Arrange apples in rows on dough, and sprinkle with remaining sugar mixture. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until apples are done and crust is browned. Cut into 1½x4-inch strips. Serve hot or cold. Makes 2½ dozen strips.

APPLE DUMPLINGS
(8 Dumplings)

Two cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons combination baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, ½ cup butter or other shortening, 1 cup milk, 8 small apples, pared and cored, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 2 tablespoons butter, ½ cup brown sugar, firmly packed, dash of nutmeg, dash of cin-

namon, 1/3 cup butter, 1 1/3 cups hot water.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening, add milk gradually, stirring until soft dough is formed. Turn out immediately on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds, or enough to shape. Roll ¼-inch thick. Cut in circles large enough to enclose a small apple. Place apple on circle, fill cavity with mixture of sugar and cinnamon, and dot with butter. Bring dough up over apple, pressing edges together. Place dumplings in pan, with joined edges underneath; allow space between each.

Combine sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon, butter, and water, and pour into pan with dumplings. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 15 minutes; then decrease heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and bake 25 minutes longer.

EIRE PREPARES TO MOVE CHILDREN

DUBLIN, Feb. 6 (AP)—The Irish government announced last night plans to remove children from Dublin, Dúnlaighaire and Kingston in event of emergency.

The government said it would provide transportation and maintenance grants for children whose yearly family income does not exceed £300 (\$1200).

The entire plan is voluntary but all children to be moved must register whether they move under the government plan or otherwise.

The plan, it was said, will operate only when it is considered "absolutely necessary."
