

Interesting Review Given Before DAR

Business Meeting Monday Devoted To Plans for Annual Convention of Oregon Society

Mrs. Claude Davis gave an interesting review of the historical novel, "Three Harbours," by Van Wyck Mason, Monday evening at the regular meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, held at the home of Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall. Mrs. Harry Ackley and Miss Virginia West were assisting hostesses.

Mrs. Davis, in her review, confined her talk mostly to the background of the story, rather than to the romantic tale. The time was the period just prior to the American Revolution (1774-5), the locale the three harbours, Boston, Norfolk, and Bermuda. Conditions were similar to those of today in many respects. Agitators were branding as criminals and traitors all who did not see eye to eye with them. Citizens were reluctant to take any stand that would affect their pocketbooks adversely. People of different sections were suspicious of each other.

Mrs. Davis quoted from "The March of Democracy," by James Truslow Adams, and from, "The Hudson," by Carl Cramer, in order to make more clear the setting of the story.

At the January general meeting of the Klamath chapter, League of Women Voters, the letter which was written to Judge David R. Vandenberg in regard to the recent appointment of the county juvenile officer, was read and approved. The letter was written by the League in collaboration with the Klamath County Council of PTA, the Business and Professional Women and the American Association of University Women.

Word has been received here that preliminary plans for the annual convention of the Oregon League of Women Voters, which will draw delegates from every section of the state scheduled for April 22, 23, at the Portland hotel in Portland, are being announced this week. Mrs. E. W. St. Pierre, capable organization chairman and last year's general convention chairman will again head the convention committee. In expressing approval of the board's decision to lengthen the convention Mrs. Thomas Sharp, president of the Oregon League, pointed out that the extra day would allow more time for the membership and department chairmen to participate in program building. This method of program building is traditional with the League and the resulting training in the democratic processes is one of the important factors in League membership, according to League officers.
