

Business Women Propose Changes

Meeting Monday Night Brings Many Suggestions From BPW Club for Improvements in City

The question, "What, in your opinion, does Klamath Falls need most," provided an interesting sidelight at the Business and Professional Women's club dinner meeting Monday evening. Chief among the impromptu answers were suggestions concerning traffic control, with double parking strictly banned, parking meters installed, adequate traffic signals, and more light on city streets.

Other suggestions were for the building of a home, preferably a YWCA, for out-of-town women who come here to work; a women's rest room in Moore park, and the cleaning up of a vacant city lot, centrally located, where benches could be provided for women to rest during shopping tours. Last but not least was a far-sighted suggestion concerning the possible need for an air raid shelter.

Reverend Victor Phillips of the Methodist church, who is a native of England, gave an interesting talk on, "What Price Peace," Mrs. Jewell Cantrill, accompanied by Marie Obenchain, sang.

At the regular business meeting, the first of a series of donations was given to send to the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs to aid in a nation-wide attempt to raise money to purchase soup kitchens for Britain. Each unit costs \$1500, and according to the plan, for every twenty-five cents contributed by members three units can be purchased.

A discussion of tentative plans for the annual inter-club banquet was begun by Sylvia McClellan, who will act as chairman for the Business and Professional Women's club, 1941 hostesses.

Chairman for the evening was Irma Badger, head of the International Relations committee.
