## Oregon Wins From Beavers In Overtime Game 36-35

Hank Anderson Ices Contest With Push Shot in Last 17 Seconds

**EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 10 (UP)**—Center Hank Anderson came off the bench Saturday night to sink an overhead shot that won a 36 to 35 overtime period victory for the University of Oregon over Oregon State college before 6700 spectators.

The score was tied 31-31 at the end of the regular period. With Oregon State leading, 35-34, Anderson came into the game. He tossed in a two-handed push shot with 17 seconds left to play.

Oregon State led at half time, 17 to 10. Mandic, Oregon State center, was high point man with 14. Borchert of Oregon and Dement of Oregon State followed with 10 each.

It was the second time in a week that Oregon's Hank Anderson made the winning basket for his team during the last minute of play. The crippled Webfoot star gave a like performance against the University of Washington last Tuesday.

Oregon State led throughout the game and the overtime period until the last 15 seconds when Oregon managed to tie the score at 29 all. Webfoot Captain Andrews tallied the tying points on free throws.

Quick baskets by Dement for the Staters and Borchert for the Webfoots moved the count to 31 all where it stayed to the end of the regular playing period.

At the start of the overtime period, Oregon State tallied first on a short try by Shaw. Marshik again tied it up with a basket only to have Oregon State's Mandic race down the floor for a tip in shot.

A free throw by Andrews brought Oregon to within one point of the Staters. Then Anderson made the winning basket with a long center loop shot.

## Tokle Bests Jump Record

Norway Club Skier Soars 273 Feet at Leavenworth

**LEAVENWORTH, Wash., Feb. 10 (AP)**—Hurling into space with a loud "Oop" as he left the takeoff, Torgor Tokle of the Norway Ski club, New York, set a new American amateur competitive ski jumping record yesterday with a leap of 273 feet.

His jump helped him win the 13th annual Leavenworth ski jumping tournament at this little village nestled in the Cascade mountains, and came only a few hours after Alf Engen leaped 267 feet at Iron Mountain, Mich.

Both leaps bettered the former North American record of 257 feet set at Iron Mountain in 1939 by Bob Roeker.

"Oop"  
A near record crowd of close to 4500 persons lined the outrun and dotted the nearby mountainous slopes as Tokle, No. 50, came booming down the inrun for his first leap.

At the takeoff he cut loose with an audible "Oop" and went flying down the hill as the thousands of spectators first yelled in surprise, then cheered.

On his second run Tokle, 21 years old, leaped 266 feet, just a foot shorter than that of Engen, the 1940 national jumping and four-way champion.

The Leavenworth meet was Tokle against the field, and Tokle made it stick. The closest jump to him was by Sig Ulland, veteran Norwegian "yumper" who hails this year from Lake Tahoe, Calif. He did 250 and 245 feet to place second.

Tokle led with 231.79 points. Sig Ulland was second with 218.55 points; Roy Mikkelsen, Auburn, Calif., was third with 211.90; Olaf Ulland of Portland, Sig's brother, was fourth with 207.35 and Art Granstrom, of Ione, Wash., fifth with 204.10.

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# Timbermen Lose to Visitors

## Wildcats Lose 34-33 To Luthers

Hammer's Squad Starts Impressively in First Period, Leading 15-2

A smooth-working, ball-hawking Weyerhaeuser Timber company basketball team of Longview, Wash., shellacked the Klamath Weyerhaeusers, 53-26, in the feature game of a double-header program Saturday night at the armory pavilion.

Featuring a fast break and a quick, short-passing game, the invaders played rings around the locals during every session except the closing moments of the fourth quarter when the Klamath five outscored their rivals, 14-11.

Speedy Tiz Miller, midget forward who led the visiting contingent in the scoring column with 14 counters, was the sparkplug of the Longview club's attack. Besides garnering six points himself in the first quarter he set up shots for his teammates on several other occasions to help his team to 13-4 margin at the end of this stanza.

Don Lee, long shot artist, dumped in five baskets in the first half, and the winners pulled away to a 28-10 advantage at the intermission with John Vaughn, big center, controlling both backboards very effectively.

In the third quarter the Washingtonians ran their margin to 30 points as Miller, Vaughn and Jack Westervelt, the other forward, continued swishing shots through the hoop. Score at the fourth and final period started 42-12 for the visitors.

Buck Ferguson and Joe Schroeder, the Klamath forwards, finally found the range in the last quarter to manufacture three buckets apiece. Together with a single goal by Paul McCulloch, pivot man, these points constituted the local Weyerhaeuser club's 14-point aggregate which beat their opponent's total in the same period by three points.

The Klamathites salvaged one bit of glory from the defeat when Buck Ferguson found the hoop eight times for 16 markers and high point honors for the tilt. His total included four field goals in each half.

A return contest may be arranged for next month at Longview, according to Frank Smith, coach of the local quintet. There is a possibility that a strengthened lineup may make the journey to the Washington city to tackle the same team that played here Saturday night. The Longview five now has a season record of 14 wins in 17 games.

In a fast, free-scoring preliminary Saturday evening the Luthers, first-place team of the Church league, nosed out the KUHS Wildcats, 34-33, in a contest that featured the scoring of "Swan" Swanson, Lutheran center, who tallied 14, and Mickey Butler, Wildcat guard, who potted 12 points.

Coach Buck Hammer's high school squad started out impressively and appeared to be on the way to a one-sided victory by posting a 15-2 lead at the close of the initial eight-minute period. But the Luthers, paced by Swanson who accounted for nine tallies, came back strong in the second quarter to trail only, 18-20, at half time.

The more experienced Luthers, pulling their opponents out of position with some clever floor play, managed to go ahead as the third session closed, 28-23. In the fourth period the favored Wildcats tried desperately to tie up the game by checking the Luthers all the way up the court but to no avail as Joe Schroeder, Lutheran forward, sunk a two-point clincher with only a minute to play.

**SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Feb. 10 (AP)**—Lawson Little won the Texas open yesterday with an 11-under-par 273.

Little, a master shot maker in the three days he battled snow, high wintry winds, rain and sunshine to card 74-62-70-67—273 to win by three strokes over silent Ben Hogan of White Plains, N. Y., played his first round of golf in San Antonio two decades ago.

Little was infallible after the opening round, played in cold weather. His 62 in the snow and slush Saturday was one of golf's greatest competitive rounds. It tied the PGA 18-hole record.

Hogan three-putted seven greens through the final 36 holes to wind up at 276.

## Miller Eyed As Notre Dame Athletic Head

**SOUTH BEND, Ind., Feb. 10 (AP)**—Don Miller, Cleveland lawyer and one of the famed "four horsemen" has the inside track as Notre Dame's new athletic director if he wants the job, the Associated Press learned from authoritative sources today.

Miller, the only member of the famous Irish backfield of 1923-24 who passed up coaching as a career, was scheduled to confer today with the Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, president of Notre Dame, on the coaching vacancy.

The vacancy was created last Monday when Elmer Layden resigned suddenly as athletic director and head football coach to take a five-year contract as commissioner of professional football at \$20,000 a year.

Miller, who coached the Portland Industrial league club, Klamath led, 16-6, at the intermission.

Baker Takes Blue Mountain Lead By Double Win Over Pendleton

Out of the hurly-burly of closely-contested southern Oregon conference high school basketball, Roseburg sank into the deep, deep peace of a safer league lead with a 26 to 22 victory over Medford Saturday.

The win strengthened Roseburg's grasp on the title, previously endangered by Medford's 35-27 victory over Grants Pass Friday. A Medford repeat Saturday would have squeezed Ashland into the lead.

**Baker Takes Lead**  
Baker went into the lead in the Blue Mountain conference by taking both ends of a series from Pendleton, 40 to 30 Friday and 37 to 30 Saturday.

Outside of Roseburg's win, the week-end play was confusing. In eastern Oregon La Grande's Tigers, who had not won a Blue Mountain league game this year, knocked over the loop leaders, Mac Hi's Pioneers, who until their 27-17 defeat Friday had given indication they were going places.

In the mid-Columbia area a Hood River team that apparently was not going any place toppled a highly-favored Astoria quintet, 25 to 24, on Friday. Astoria bounced right back Saturday, however, to clean The Dalles 33 to 20.

**Salem on Top**  
In western Oregon McMinnville upset Oregon City, 31-30, and in southern Oregon Klamath Falls showed surprising strength in galloping away from Ashland, 52-23.

Steadfast Salem made dopest feel easier about it all by staying at the top of the No Name league with a 56-41 win over Albany, and Tillamook kept second place in the loop by trouncing Milwaukie, 56-13.

Silverton kept in front in the Big Nine league, downing Canby, 47-24, while Gresham beat Corbett, 24-12. Woodburn won from Chemawa, 45-39, Parkrose walloped Sandy, 44-17, and Estacada nosed out Molalla, 25-24.

In district play Eugene won from Springfield, 31-20, and University high (Eugene) shaded Cottage Grove, 21-20. St. Helens seized one from Rainier, 24-23. Columbia prep trimmed Central Catholic of Portland 44-15, Dallas 50 to 24.

The meet's only impressive time was made by Oregon's Jack Dallas who negotiated the 200-yard breaststroke in 2:32.5.
