for us and liberty-loving people everywhere if this bill could be adopted with a non-partisan and almost unanimous vote.

"I urge the majority (in congress) to examine provisions with the spirit of candor and sincerity to see if the bill's true objective cannot be accomplished and yet eliminate any unnecessary grant of authority."

Willkie said that while the majority did not need the votes of opponents to enact the legislation, the approval of opponents "and the approval of millions of Americans whom they represent" would give the nation "the strength of a united people—a strength greater than that of armaments or battleships."

Willkie spoke in the knowledge that 22,000,000 people voted for him to be president.

Discussing his suggestion for transferring five to ten destroyers a month to Britain, Willkie declared that although 50 destroyers recently had been traded to the British for western hemisphere naval bases, "Britain needs still more destroyers."

"Merchant ships are making the (transoceanic) crossing without nearly enough protection; in some cases thirty or forty ships may be protected by only a couple of destroyers."

"The fifty destroyers that we delivered to the British some months ago have proved extremely valuable. But owing to congestion and the shortage of mechanics, Britain found it difficult to recondition all of them at once."

While supplying destroyers to Britain, Willkie declared, the destroyer construction program should be expanded so vessels transferred could be promptly replaced.

"Aid to Britain" he defined as meaning "Not to work for Britain but to work with Britain to defend an area of freedom."

He said that if Britain "prevails" the "enslaved democracies of Europe will revive."

No Help

Reliable diplomatic sources in Sofia said last night that Arkady A. Soboleff, a special Russian envoy to Sofia, had told Bogdan Philoff and Ivan Popoff, Bulgaria's premier and foreign minister, not to expect the red army to intervene if Germany should march through.

Three hundred miles on the other side of Bulgaria, across the Greek frontier, Britain has an air fleet and the break yesterday in British-Rumanian relations is regarded as a sign that she would not hesitate to use it if the nazis penetrated deeper into the southeast.

ISTANBUL, Feb. 11 (AP)—The Turkish official newspaper Otrakt said today that German troops were arriving steadily in Bulgaria, their officers declaring: "Our goal is the Bosphorus and Mediterranean."

The newspapers attributed its reports to a Turk long resident in Bulgaria. "German soldiers wearing civilian overcoats were taken from Dobruja and the Bulgarian Black sea port of Varna to the interior of Bulgaria in trucks," the article said. "About 200 truck loads of these soldiers have been seen passing through a village of Dobruja."

PROMINENT WOMAN SPEAKER ARRIVES

An outstanding visitor in Klamath Falls is Mrs. F. John Scroggie, wife of a noted London minister, who arrived here Monday evening to remain this week lecturing on "The English Women in the Crisis."

Mrs. Scroggie was honored at tea Tuesday afternoon in the First Presbyterian church following her lecture. She has been one of the leading British women to head war relief work in England and in this work has been intimately associated with Lady Halifax, wife of the new British ambassador to the United States and also with Lady Reading. The relief work is headed by Queen Elizabeth.

The visitor will speak Wednesday and Thursday on the topics, "Visions," and "Our Responsibility in Soul-Winning." Wednesday at 8:30 p. m., she will speak over KFIJ. Dr. Scroggie will speak Friday afternoon, "The Midnight Hour of Human History."

Monday night Dr. Scroggie spoke to the Men's Brotherhood of the First Baptist church, and later spoke in the Presbyterian church on, "The Path of Life." He was to speak Tuesday night on, "The Ideal Life." The service each evening is at 8 o'clock.

Oregon Power company for removing fire alarm wires from telephone to power poles, was discussed by the council and upon recommendation of Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose the council stood on the original bid of \$250, and not \$586.56 as submitted in the Copco statement. The estimate was made in 1939, and work accomplished in 1940, Ambrose stated.

W. A. Sellwood appeared before the council and asked permission to hook onto the line owned by the city adjacent to Shasta way for use at the proposed mission. Upon recommendation of City Engineer E. A. Thomas, was granted.

E. A. Dunham, Klamath Falls businessman, approached council members in regard to the airport levy, suggesting that if the council found \$25,000 sufficient to buy property and administrative airport funds, and handled in the first two years, that it not be necessary to make levies the last one or two years.

Engineer Thomas pointed out it was necessary to ask for more than needed as returns on tax levies were never 100 per cent. The balance could be returned to the general fund and used to reduce taxes.

Said Mayor Houston, "if we don't need it, let's not collect it!" The matter was referred to City Attorney D. E. Van Vector to see what legal steps could be taken to handle the airport fund in this manner.

The city hall will close Feb. 12 and 22, it was decided by city fathers. They also authorized Police Judge Leigh Ackerman to attend a meeting in Salem as a representative of Klamath Falls police officers meeting with the committee of roads and highways concerning senate bill No. 55 as requested by the League of Oregon Cities.

Councilman Cantrill, Martin, and Bussman, according to the latter, held a recent meeting discussing the problems of cleaning up Main street. Bussman said the three felt property owners should do more washing of sidewalks and less sweeping of debris into the streets, and that Main street garbage cans should be painted and fixed up to be a credit to the town and let people know for what they were to be used.

Councilman Walter Wiesen-danger, Mayor John Houston, and City Engineer Thomas will meet at the request of Wiesen-danger at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday in the council chambers to discuss means of improving the parking strip along Pacific Terrace.

Orphan Diplomats To Leave Rumania With British

BUCHAREST, Feb. 11 (AP)—More than 30 diplomats representing little nations swallowed by German armies will leave Rumania with the British diplomatic mission when it sails for Istanbul, it was disclosed today.

The legations are those of Norway, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg, all representing governments now established in exile in England or Canada.

The specially chartered steamer is expected to leave the Rumanian Black sea port of Constanta Friday night or Saturday morning with a passenger list of nearly 150, including British and allied legation officials, British consular officers and many British businessmen long established in this country.

Bieber Railroad Men Injured

BIEBER, Calif., Feb. (Special) Two railroad workers were seriously injured when a motor car carrying a section gang ran into an earth and rock slide on the Western Pacific track and was wrecked 10 miles south of Bieber Monday night.

Foreman Harold Allen suffered leg and chest injuries and Edward Lundberg a possible skull fracture. Allen flagged a freight train which brought them to Nubieber.

Another slide and a large boulder on the track had been reported and the men were speeding toward it when they hit the new slide.

HOUSE BOOSTS DEBT LIMIT TO 65 BILLIONS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (UPI) The house Monday approved a \$16,000,000,000 boost of the national debt ceiling to \$65,000,000,000 and sent the measure to the senate.

The legislation also authorizes the federal government to tax income from all future government securities and opens the way for a "buy a bond" campaign in which savings certificates would be sold to the public to help finance the defense program.

Approval was by voice vote and came on the first legislative day after the house passed the controversial British aid bill.

\$493 Each Person Before the house approved the boost, Rep. Albert J. Engel, R., Mich., said the \$65,000,000,000 figure would mean a debt of \$493 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Passage came after the chamber killed renewed republican attempts to hold the limit to \$60,000,000,000.

Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau, Jr., had urged speedy approval of the bill on grounds the government would face an acute financial crisis next May unless the borrowing authority was expanded to meet the rising cost of the huge defense effort. He said by then appropriations would exceed the treasury's cash resources and the government's unused borrowing authority.

British Penetrate Into Ethiopia

CAIRO, Egypt, Feb. 11 (AP)—Motorized soufan African troops have advanced to a depth of some 50 miles into southern Ethiopia on a front 30 to 40 miles broad and routed Italian troops, mostly native levies, militia, dispatches said tonight.

This British advance, northeast of Lake Rudolf, was said to have threatened Italian communications between western Ethiopia and Italian Somaliland.

The British middle east command announced continued success today in its giant pincer movement aimed at squeezing the Italians out of their east African empire.

House Votes Dies Additional Time

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—The house voted overwhelmingly today to give the Dies committee another 15 months in which to investigate un-American activities after dramatically striking from the record a speech by Rep. Dickstein (D-N.Y.) accusing the committee of favoring fascist groups.

HANNOVER BOMBED IN RAF ASSAULT

German city, the air ministry account said. Hannover, with a population of nearly 500,000, is the junction of the east-west Berlin-Cologne and north-south Hamburg-Frankfurt trunk lines. It has been a frequent target of the RAF.

Another smaller RAF force attacked oil installations in the dock area of Rotterdam, starting large fires and explosions, and raided several other targets in northwest Germany and two airdromes in Holland, the air ministry said.

Following up a daylight attack yesterday on Boulogne, additional craft of the same command were reported to have plastered the harbor of the French port again overnight with high explosives.

Still other raids were made on Cherbourg and Ostend, where returning pilots said large fires were observed.

In all these operations, only four British planes were reported missing.

ROME, Feb. 11 (AP)—British planes bombed Sicily and southern Italy last night, causing some damage at an unidentified town in Apulia and near Avellino where four persons were killed and several injured, the Italian high command reported today. Anti-aircraft guns at Battaglia were reported to have shot down one British plane. Its crew parachuted to the ground and was captured, the high command said.

Earthquake Jolts Santa Barbara But No Damage Done

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Feb. 11 (AP)—A jarring earthquake jolted Santa Barbara last night, but a police check disclosed that its chief effect was to send residents running to their telephones.

Police, fire department and newspaper switchboards were jammed within a few moments with hundreds of calls.

There were no aftershocks and a survey indicated that the tremor was purely local, probably centering along the San Andreas fault, which cuts through the mountains east of here.

It was there that a quake originated in 1925, killing 11 persons and causing heavy property damage.

The shock was California's third in recent days. Early Sunday Eureka reported a strong jolt, which briefly threatened a dance hall panic. January 29, the Los Angeles metropolitan area was rocked by a quake seismologists reported centered at a depth of nine miles near Whittier.

Dr. John P. Buwalda of the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, said other adjustments might be expected.
