

PERMITS FOR BUILDING GET BOOST MONDAY

February building figures were upped considerably Monday with an application filed by Harry L. Watts for an \$11,000 structure which will include two units of four units each, one and one-half stories high, 30 by 60 feet. The buildings will go up on lots one and two, block 10, Buena Vista addition.

An additional permit to remodel a business building at the corner of Ninth and Main streets at a cost of \$2000, was issued to the Brotherton Construction company. This is in the building formerly occupied by Safeway stores, and will soon be used as new quarters for the Klamath Variety store.

Whitlocks, at Sixth and Pine street, will be remodeled by the Brotherton Construction company at a cost of \$300, according to Building Inspector Harold Franey.

Foster and Kleiser petitioned the construction of numerous signs throughout the city including one at South Sixth street and the viaduct at a cost of \$50; lot 11, block 10, Canal addition, \$25; on the Baldwin building, Ewauna Heights, \$25; lot 6, block 12, Fairview addition No. 2, \$25; lot 2, block 42, Mills Second addition next to McKays, \$25; three sheet panel on South Sixth street, lot 10, block 104, Klamath addition, \$25.

Bert Borgioli was issued a permit to remodel a building at 1917 South Sixth street at a cost of \$150.

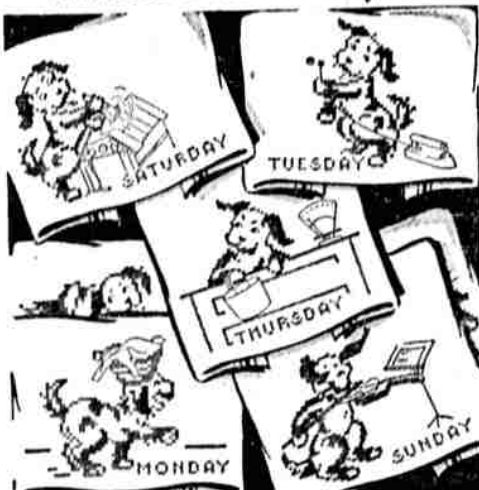
RECRUITING POST LISTS VACANCIES IN ALASKAN ARMY

The United States army recruiting office, 323 main post-office building, Portland, announces that there are a number of vacancies in the 1st signal service company, Seattle, Wash., for duty with the Alaska communication system in Alaska.

Applicants must have the following qualifications: Be a high school graduate, touch typist with speed of at least 20 words per minute. They also must be able to receive international Morse code at the rate of 15 words per minute for men under 28 and 18 words for men over 26. All applicants who hold first class commercial radiotelephone, first or second class commercial radiotelegraph, or a class A or B amateur license are acceptable regardless of radio code speed or typing ability. These vacancies cover the three-year enlistment.
