

BURGLARS ROB SAFEGWAY STORE OVER WEEKEND

Prowlers obtained a neat haul in silver, currency and checks as the result of Saturday and Sunday's business when they made off with contents of the safe in the Safeway store at Oregon avenue and Upham streets during early morning hours Monday.

City police noticed the safe gone from the front of the store and investigated shortly after 2 a. m. They found the safe had been moved by a small hand truck to the back of the store and the hinges taken from the door. The combination was "punched." Chief of Police Frank Hamm stated.

Entrance to the building was gained through the vent in the basement line and up through a trap door.

City police are keeping an eye peeled for checks written on papers taken from McKaig's Feed store, 2320 Vine avenue sometime Monday night. Included in the loot was a sum of money, a check, protector, one fountain pen, one bottle of ink, and blank checks from the US National Bank—in fact, as police observed—all necessary equipment for check writing.

Just how much money was removed was not known. Entrance to the building was gained through the back door which had been held closed by nails. A pocket knife was used to force the money drawer.

OPTION TAKEN ON LAND NEAR CITY AIRPORT

City Engineer E. A. Thomas said Wednesday that the city has completed options on all property near the airport on which agreements as to price have been made with owners.

Preparations are being made to start condemnation proceedings on the other property the city wants for its airport development.

Engineer Thomas said that it appears the city will not benefit from the \$469,606 appropriation by the WPA for the Klamath airport, unless the development by the CAA is dropped. The CAA has an appropriation for \$254,000 for the airport, and it will probably be decided to proceed with the latter development instead of the WPA program. Clarifying information on the two appropriations is awaited.

An election has been called for March 5 on a proposal to vote a four-year special levy of 1.8 mills to acquire property for the airport.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 12 (AP)—Abraham Lincoln's 132nd birthday anniversary was commemorated today with the dedication of the \$75,000 Lincolniana collection given to the Illinois State Historical library by the late Governor Henry Horner. Lincoln's spirit of democracy was praised by representatives of Mexico and Canada at an international program last night.

Governor Dwight H. Green lauded the "thoughtful generosity" of the late Governor Horner in donating his impressive Lincolniana collection to the state historical library in dedicating the library's Henry Horner room. Carl Sandburg, poet and Lincoln biographer, also participated.

Lincoln's belief in democracy was stressed by Governor Green. "Democracy, to him, was the only possible system of government," the governor declared in a prepared address, "not only because it was sacred in and of itself, but because it was the only form of government under which free men could find full play for the talents with which they were endowed."

"What he saw was not a system but a society. It was a society without rigid class distinctions, a society in which a laborer could, with industry and frugality, himself become an employer. A society in which education was the privilege of all, and in which even a poor boy could obtain the highest eminence."

Border Inspector Finds Gold in Canadian Car

SEATTLE, Feb. 12 (AP) — A customs officer's routine examination of automobiles entering the United States from Canada at Blaine frustrated yesterday an attempt to smuggle \$55,000 in gold into this country.

Leo E. Morland, 39, of Vancouver, B. C., was arrested after the officer found 57 gold bars hidden between the inner wall and metal outer wall of his car's trunk compartment.

Fred H. Bradt, customs agent in charge in Seattle, who filed a smuggling charge against Morland, said the Canadian man told him the gold was "accumulated" in Australia and was smuggled first into Canada.

Bradt said an extensive investigation will be made into Morland's object in bringing the gold into this country.

He pointed out that Morland is in the peculiar position of facing possible prosecution in both the United States and Canada. Bradt said the usual procedure after trial in this country would be to deport him to Canada, where he could be charged with breaking the wartime law regulating the amount of money that may be taken out of the country at one time.

bill to increase the rate of interest on loans on motor vehicles from 2 to 21 per cent a month on the first \$300, but passed 21 to 8 a bill to give the state banking department increased supervision over small loan companies.

The senate passed and sent to the governor bills to provide means for federal savings and loan associations to revert to state control.

Sen. Douglas McKay (R-Marion) said he has drafted a fair trade bill, modeled after the Washington state law, which would be more enforceable than the present Oregon fair trade law.

The existing law is designed to prevent stores from selling for less than six per cent above cost, and it affects food primarily. If a store is hurt by another store selling for less than cost, it would file suit individually. Suits by associations of independent stores are barred.

The bill by McKay provides that associations could ask courts for redress, and that the price of any article shall be a fixed percentage above the cost of doing business. The percentage would be determined by merchants association, and it is eight per cent in Washington.

Independent merchants are backing the bill, while chain stores oppose it. The independents contend they receive no protection under the existing law, while the bill would give them a chance to compete equally with chains.

The chains charge that the bill is a price-fixing measure and that the housewife would pay the bill in higher food prices. The senate education committee introduced a memorial to ask congress to assist school districts which are overburdened because of new rearmament industries and military establishments in their districts.

Sen. Rex Ellis (R-Umatilla) and Rep. Frank J. Loneragan (R-Multnomah) introduced a bill to increase the salary of the state labor commissioner from \$3600 to \$4800 a year.

garia placed with Nazi factories and has already been paid for. Bulgarian Foreign Minister Ivan Popoff held long conferences today with the German and Italian ministers in Sofia, but the nature of their discussions was not disclosed.

The German minister, his hat pulled low over his eyes, went to the Bulgarian foreign office in a taxi instead of using his familiar legation car.

Dispatches from Sofia, the Bulgarian capital, published today in pro-axis newspapers in other Balkan centers said Bulgaria "fears England is about to violate her neutrality, thus dragging Bulgaria into the war," by sending RAF planes over the country to bomb Rumanian oil fields.

British offices from the middle east command returned today to Ankara, capital of Turkey, from an inspection of Turkish fortifications facing Bulgaria, reports from Istanbul said. The British mission has been in Turkey nearly a month.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—The condition of Representative Dies (D-Tex.) was described as "very good" today by attendants at the hospital where he went to recover from nervous strain and exhaustion.

The Texan collapsed in his office yesterday shortly after he had successfully sought continuance of his committee to investigate un-American activities.
