

1941 Angling Seasons And Bag Limits

General Open Season for Trout Over Six Inches
April 12 to October 15, inclusive; except as follows:
May 3 to November 1, inclusive, in Baker, Union, Umatilla, Grant, Malheur, Walla, Harney, Lake, Gilliam, Wheeler and Morrow counties.

General Bag Limit for Trout Over Six Inches
15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Special Bag Limits
Diamond Lake: Bag limit is 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 5 fish in any 1 day, or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 20 fish in any 7 consecutive days.
Fish Lake (Jackson county): Bag limit is 10 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 10 fish in any 1 day, or 20 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 20 fish in any 7 consecutive days.
East Lake (Deschutes county): Bag limit is 10 fish but not more than 15 pounds and 1 fish in any 1 day, or 20 fish but not more than 30 pounds and 1 fish in any 7 consecutive days.
Lake of the Woods (Klamath county): Bag limit is 10 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any 1 day, or 20 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish in any 7 consecutive days.
Todd Lake (Deschutes county): Bag limit is 10 fish but not to exceed 15 pounds and 1 fish in any 1 day, or 20 fish but not to exceed 30 pounds and 1 fish in any 7 consecutive days.

DESCHUTES COUNTY
Deschutes River and its tributaries, except as otherwise hereinafter provided, open season for angling April 12 to September 30, both dates inclusive.
South Twin, Taylor and Irish Lakes, closed to angling.
All tributaries of Devils Lake, Sparks Lake and Three Creeks Lake, closed to angling.
Quinn Creek, tributary to Mud Lake, closed to angling.
Todd Lake, open season for angling July 1 to September 20, inclusive. (See special bag limit).
Deer, Big Cultus, Little Cultus, Winnopis, Green, Maiden and Hidden lakes, open season for angling May 20 to October 15, inclusive.
That part of the Deschutes river and its tributaries from Sheep bridge, about two miles below Crane Prairie dam, upstream to the Deschutes bridge on Century Drive, closed to angling.
Paulina lake, open season for angling May 1 to September 20, both dates inclusive; provided that that part of Paulina lake upstream from the irrigation company's dam to a line extending across the lake and described as follows: Beginning at a point approximately 300 yards north of the boat landing at the Paulina lake resort on the west shore; thence diagonally across the lake to the first point of land extending out into the lake, closed to angling.
East Lake, open season for angling May 1 to September 20, both dates inclusive; provided that that part of East lake west of a line beginning at a point on the north shore of said lake 20 chains south of the quarter section corner between sections 19 and 20, township 21 south, range 13 east, Willamette meridian; thence running south 28 degrees west across said lake to a point on the south shore of said lake 7 1/2 chains north of the quarter section corner between sections 30 and 31, township 21 south, range 13 east, Willamette meridian, closed to angling. (See special bag limit).
Except as otherwise herein specifically provided for, all lakes and their tributaries, open season for angling May 1 to September 20, both dates inclusive.

JACKSON COUNTY
Fish Lake, open season for angling April 12 to August 15, both dates inclusive. (See special bag limit); provided that that part of the lake from its head to a distance of one-quarter mile below the head of said lake, closed to angling.
That part of the Rogue river for a distance of 100 yards above the fish racks at Rogue Elk, closed to angling.
That part of the Rogue river from the Gold Ray dam to a point 100 yards below Gold Ray bridge, closed to angling.
Also see Rogue river regulations.

KLAMATH COUNTY
All tributaries of Big Marsh creek, closed to angling.
Klamath river, open season for angling January 1 to May 31, inclusive, and September 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided that that part of said river for a distance 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek, closed to angling.
Spencer creek, closed to angling.
All tributaries of Odell lake closed to angling.
That part of Crescent creek from the mouth of Cold creek downstream to where it empties into Little Deschutes river, closed to angling.
Paradise creek, tributary to South Fork of Sprague river, closed to angling.
That part of the Little Deschutes river and its tributaries above the Southern Pacific railway bridge located in section 31, township 25 south, range 8 east, closed to angling.
That part of Crooked creek, tributary to Wood river, lying within the boundaries of the state game commission hatchery property, closed to angling.
That part of Link river beginning at the California-Oregon Power company's dam on said river to a point 200 feet below said dam, closed to angling.
Seven Mile creek, open season for angling April 12 to September 30, both dates inclusive.
Odell lake, closed to angling.
Odell lake, open season for angling April 12 to October 31, both dates inclusive; provided that that portion of Odell lake from a point 200 feet west of the west shore of the outlet to Chiniquap Point, closed to angling.
Crescent lake, open season for angling April 12 to October 31, both dates inclusive.
Lake of the Woods, open season for angling April 12 to November 30, both dates inclusive. (See special bag limit).
All lakes in Klamath county except Lake of the Woods, Upper Klamath lake, Agency lake, Davis lake, Odell lake, Crescent lake and those lakes closed to angling entirely, open season for angling May 20 to September 20, both dates inclusive.

LAKE COUNTY
Drake creek, Roaring Spring creek, Dismal creek, Cogswell creek, Dog creek (tributary of Bear creek), Bear creek and all tributaries of said streams, closed to angling.
That portion of Camas creek and its tributaries above the forest boundary on the line between sections 1 and 6, township 39 south, range 21 east, and township 39 south, range 22 east, W. M., closed to angling.
That portion of Deep creek and its tributaries lying above the forest boundary on the line between sections 2 and 11, township 38 south, range 19 east, W. M., closed to angling.
That portion of the South Fork of Sprague river and its tributaries lying east of the Klamath-Lake county line, closed to angling.
That portion of Dairy creek and its tributaries, including Deer creek, lying above the Forest Service bridge in section 4, township 36 south, range 17 east, W. M., closed to angling.
That portion of Guyer creek above its confluence with Silver creek, closed to angling.
That portion of Camp creek and its tributaries above the forest boundary, closed to angling.
Campbell lake, closed to angling.
Blue lake, open season for angling July 1 to October 15, inclusive.
Deerhorse lake, open season for angling July 1 to September 10, inclusive.
Dog lake, open season for angling entire year.

Oregon Sports Notes

John Leovich's withdrawal from Oregon State college in favor of contract with the Philadelphia Athletics of the American league brought the usual charge of cradle-snatching against major league baseball, but L. E. Gregory and a few other sports writers hold contradictory views.

Leovich was one of Oregon State's first flight football players and a talented catcher on the baseball team. He had a season of eligibility left.

"This was no cradle-snatch," writes Greg in his Oregonian column. "Johnny, faced with urgent home responsibilities, made up his mind after having given the Orange two years of football that it was up to him to go to work, as many a college youth before him has had to do."

George Vranizan, the deputy U. S. marshal in the Portland office, put Leovich on the contract which, Bruce Myers of the Corvallis Gazette Times hears will net him \$4000 next baseball season whether he sticks with the A's or not. Vranizan is a friend of Roy Mack of the A's. He ascertained beyond all doubt that Leovich was determined to quit college sport for a professional contract and decided that as long as the die was cast the A's might as well grab the boy.

There is a rather fine distinction between a cradle-snatch and a legitimate sign-up of an under-graduate collegian. As Greg says, the economic need prompted Leovich to sign after giving two seasons to Oregon State. Whether or not that fact takes the case out of the cradle-snatch department is a moot question.

The same is true of most under-graduates who sign away their eligibility. Vranizan says Leovich had reached a decision to step out as a collegian. Most collegians involved in cradle-snatch cases reach similar decisions. Sometimes the scouts talk them into it, but frequently they decide for themselves. Then, of course, nobody knows how much pressure might have been applied, sub rosa.

Myers thinks Leovich picked a good club. "He goes to a club which has long looked with kindness on college stars. Didn't Sam Chapman make the jump from the University of California to the A's outfield in one season?"

"It is reported Leovich has a contract—said to call for about \$4000—regardless of whether he sticks in the majors or is farmed out."

"Leovich is a good prospect if he can pick up a little speed. An excellent receiver, a great thrower and above all a smart pitcher handler. Johnny's main liability last season was about 15 to 20 pounds excess weight, which slowed him down a lot."
