

RUSSIAN SUICIDE THEORY SUPPORTED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The last friend of General Walter G. Krivitsky to see him alive was convinced today that the former Russian secret agent committed suicide, but other associates held to the belief that he had been assassinated.

Washington police who examined Krivitsky's body after it was found in a hotel room here Monday were strongly inclined to agree with the suicide theory advanced by the Russian's friend, Eitel Wolf Dohert.

Dohert, a former German army officer now living in a log cabin near Charlottesville, Va., said Krivitsky spent on Thursday until Sunday with him and while there penned the three farewell notes found beside his body. Dohert said he helped Krivitsky buy a .38 calibre pistol in Charlottesville. An identical blood-stained weapon was at Krivitsky's hand when the body was discovered by a chambermaid.

The behavior of the mysterious little Russian throughout his visit to the cabin, Dohert said, indicated that he intended to kill himself.

Nevertheless several of Krivitsky's friends and acquaintances declared he well might have been "liquidated" by a political assassin. In magazine articles and in testimony before the Dies committee, Krivitsky had told of his adventurous career as a member of the soviet secret police, and of his eventual break with Josef Stalin over the 1937 Russian army "purge." He often voiced his fears of Stalin's vengeance, friends recalled.

His attorney, Louis Waldman of New York, expressed indignation when the department of justice declined to enter into the death investigation. He said he had furnished the department the name of a "notorious killer" of the Russian OGPU now in this country.

Gene Tunney, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, told a Minneapolis lecture audience last night he knew Krivitsky well, and "he had too much to live for to commit suicide."

Crandall May Lose GOP Post

SALEM, Feb. 13 (AP)—Political observers said today that Kern Crandall, Portland, chairman of the state republican central committee, who now is on active duty as a major in the army, would lose his job if a bill passed by the house yesterday also is passed by the senate.

The bill provides that state and county central committees shall replace their elective officers when a vacancy occurs "on account of death, resignation or otherwise."

The bill was introduced by Rep. A. W. Meyers (R-Clackamas).

Germany Sending Art Treasures to U. S., Report

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP)—German art treasures worth at least \$8,000,000 are en route to America for sale, the British ministry of economic warfare declared today.

The ministry said the nazis hoped to gain foreign exchange to help them maintain "the German system of propaganda, espionage and sabotage."

It was said that the cargo "probably was routed via Siberia and the Pacific."

The ministry reported it consisted of 14 paintings from the Kaiser Friedrich museum at Berlin—three Rembrandts, three Van Eycks and one work each by Botticelli, Fouquet, Vermeer of Delet, Valazquez, Raphael, Giorgione, Fra Lippi and Veneziano.

Raphael, Giorgione, Fra Lippi, Veneziano and Botticelli were Italian masters, Rembrandt and Vermeer, Dutch; Van Eyck, Belgian; Fouquet, French and Valazquez, Spanish.
