Standards for Sugar Beets Set

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Fair price standards for the 1940-41 sugar beet crop were announced yesterday by the agricultural department. They provide some increases over standards established for the 1939 crop.

Prices are established as a guide for contracts between growers and processors. While they are not mandatory, processors who also are growers must pay them to qualify for benefit payments under the sugar law.

Prices vary by districts. In district 6 (Utah, Idaho, Washington and Oregon) they range from \$3.26 per ton of beets grading 14 per cent sucrose with sugar bringing an average net return of \$3 per 100 pounds, to \$6.46 per ton of beets grading 18 per cent sucrose with sugar averaging \$4.

Crooks will sing 14 numbers, choosing from old favorites and heavier opera compositions. He will be assisted by Frederick Schauwecker at the piano.

tative powers are as versatile as they are brilliant; the splendor of his voice lending itself uniformly well to songs, opera, ballads or religious music. The story of Richard Crooks is typically American. Born in Trenton, N. J., he first triumphed at the early age of 10 at an important music festival. Throughout his early youth he worked hard to earn money for the serious study of voice. From the start of his professional career in New York, he was an immediate sensation and Klamath Falls has never heard a voice which has more completely enthralled the American music world, than that of Richard Crooks.

Crooks' Metropolitan opera debut took place February 25, 1933, in Massenet's "Manon," when he received the unprecedented number of 37 curtain calls. Another of Massenet's compositions, the aria, "Pourquoi me Reveiller," from "Werther," will be sung here Friday night. Following is the program:
