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tomers desires. The proposed Klamath experiment would follow this line.

"If parking meters should be tried, it will be definitely in the nature of an experiment," said Mayor Houston. "What we want to do is to open up our streets, so that the people that come here from the surrounding areas, or come down town from residential districts, can find parking spaces with a minimum of trouble. These are the people that support the business of our community, and we want to give them the best break possible."

Free Parking

"The planning commission's proposal is that right along with parking meters there be established a municipal parking lot. That is to fit into the plan of opening up the streets."

Four years ago a nicker parking meter proposal was adopted by the city council, but without previous public discussion or opportunity for a hearing. The plan was dropped when public opposition developed.

Mayor Houston pointed out that the present proposal differs in that a penny meter is proposed definitely as an experiment, that the parking lot feature has been added, and that no action will be taken by the city council until it has had opportunity to hear everyone who wants to be heard on the question.

At the meeting last Monday night Mayor John H. Houston requested President S. W. Percy to appear with active supporters and to state their side of the case. Following the regular council meeting a delegation of prominent men and women, who formerly took part in the Humane society and Kennel club activities, voiced keen disapproval of the hiring of Percy as a pound master and requested the council consider the rehiring of Bob Frederiksen who served four years as pound master until his resignation to become county pound master—an appointment which did not materialize.

of raids on western Germany last night, an official announcement said today.

Docks at Calais, France, and Den Helder, The Netherlands, were bombed during daylight sorties across the channel yesterday.

A supply ship at anchor at Den Helder was hit, the admiralty declared, and a tanker was set afire off the coast of Norway.

Squads of firewatchers put out incendiary bombs as fast as they fell in London and no serious fires were reported in the capital during a raid which lasted from dark until nearly 11 p. m.

SKIERS SAFE
ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb. 15 (AP)—Ten of the United States army's top skiers reported themselves safe at an Alaska railroad section house today after four days trek through a raging blizzard. Their report was made by telephone while one army bomber and a civilian airplane were engaged in an aerial search for them.

NO WAR
BANGKOK, Feb. 15 (AP)—Thailand (Siam) declared by communiqué tonight that Thailand would not be drawn into the "far eastern conflict" and that nothing tending toward involvement had developed.

With its present backlog of unfilled orders, the aircraft industry in America has become the fifth largest industry in the country, exceeded only by motor vehicles, steel, meat packing and petroleum refining.

prisoners and quantities of arms and materials.

All Killed

Every soldier in three small Italian units which attempted counter-attacks was killed, wounded or captured, the Greeks said.

Greek gains in the central sector, threatening encirclement of Italian defenders there, were characterized as particularly important.

A ministry of home security communiqué said neither casualties nor damage had resulted from Italian air raids on the coast of Crete and rural districts of Arta.

BRITAIN ADMITS PARACHUTE STAB

refusing further details at present, said little more than that "soldiers dressed in recognized military uniforms have recently been dropped by parachute in southern Italy."

The Italians said the parachutists made their attack, armed with machineguns, hand grenades and dynamite, on the night of Feb. 10-11 and that all of them had been captured "before they could cause the serious damage they intended."

Safe in Uniforms

It was presumed in Rome that the principal objective of the British troopers, using tactics in which Germany and soviet Russia pioneered, was wrecking of the 152-mile-long Apulian aqueduct carrying drinking water to about 2,500,000 Italians.

(Today military sources in Rome said that uniforms worn by the captured parachutists would save them from execution as spies.)

It was believed that the attack was staged by the middle east command, with headquarters at Cairo, which is directing warfare in Africa and Greece.

The area where the landings took place offers plenty of hiding places in wooded regions.

The battle of Big Horn, in which General Custer and his men were massacred, occurred on June 25, 1876.

ever, if needed, the 1943 legislature could reenact the law.

The only votes against the bill were cast by Sens. Howard C. Belton (R-Clackamas), George W. Dunn (R-Jackson) and W. H. Strayer (D-Baker). There was no debate on the measure.

Governor Sprague asked the legislature to permit him to create a state guard, but he said he would do so only in the event of an emergency which the state police or federal troops could not handle.

The act would automatically expire as soon as the national guard troops, now in federal service, return to the state.

The senate passed and sent to the governor a bill to permit the state forester to employ parolees from the state prison in forest camps. The parolees would be paid \$30 a month plus food and lodging.

The senate approved and sent to the house a bill raising interest rates on loans on automobiles from 2 to 3 per cent a month. It would affect loans of \$300 or less.

A memorial to ask congress to pass a law permitting maritime workers to use marine hospitals was approved by the senate and sent to the house.

The senate met today, holding its second straight Saturday session, and adjourned until 10 a. m. Monday. The house, which hasn't yet met on a Saturday, was in recess. It will meet at 10:30 a. m. Monday.

Coroner Jess Treadway said Miles, 23, was wearing a brown hunting coat and that Grover, 25, evidently mistook him for an animal.

HOUSTON SELECTED TO AID TREASURER

William Houston has been named assistant to County Treasurer Chester A. Langslet, the appointment having been confirmed by the court, Langslet announced Saturday. Houston has resigned his position at the Buster Brown shoe store to take over the new work.

A bill has been introduced in the legislature to authorize appointment of a deputy county treasurer. Langslet said that if the bill passes, Houston will be named deputy.

Rain or Snow On Bill For Weekend

The Klamath basin is in for a weekend of rain or snow according to the US weatherman Saturday afternoon. Those going to the mountains are definitely promised snow the forecast set forth.

At Crater Lake national park, weekend mecca for hundreds of winter sports enthusiasts, skiing was reported as excellent with four to six inches of dry powdery snow over a normal pack. Friday's maximum was 41 degrees, the minimum 23, with Saturday morning's 8 a. m. figure given at 29. Open roads were in excellent condition for two-way traffic and chains are not required but park officials advise them to be carried.

Northern Klamath Again Blacked Out

Chiloquin, Fort Klamath, Crater Lake, Modoc Point, and Algoma were blacked out again for an hour and 20 minutes Friday night by a power failure at Lamm Lumber company mill.

According to Copco advices the outage occurred when a high-wheeled lumber carrier crashed into a guy wire supporting a power pole and swung two conductors together, kicking out the circuit.

The failure happened at 6 p. m. and was repaired at 7:23.

Manila Quells After Jap War Scare Subside

MANILA, Feb. 15 (AP)—The Philippines got back to normal today after a 48-hour war scare. Business went on as usual, and street crowds that yesterday and the day before were buzzing with talk of possible military adventures in the south Pacific, were calm again.

The main reasons for the flurry of excitement were unexplained orders which brought one Dutch vessel speeding back to the neutral waters of Manila, and cancelled the return of U. S. army officers to the United States.

News from the rest of the Orient and from capitals over the world failed, however, to give cause for alarm.

A further reason for not worrying any more was seen in apparent preparations of the Dutch merchantman Tjitjalegka to depart today and the sailing of three other Dutch ships from Manila last night and this morning.

The Tjitjalegka returned to Manila Thursday a few hours after sailing for Hongkong.

Embassy Staffs Leave Rumania

CONSTANTA, Rumania, Feb. 15 (AP)—The British embassy staff and members of allied diplomatic missions representing exiled governments of Norway, Belgium and Luxembourg, sailed at dusk today from this Black sea port, en route to Istanbul, Turkey.

United States legation officials who witnessed the departure on the Turkish liner Izmir said the sailing was without incident. Britain has broken diplomatic relations with Rumania and has declared the country to be "enemy-occupied territory."

The British left Bucharest last midnight.

One Killed, Two Burned In Blast

LIVINGSTONE, Bowie County, Tex., Feb. 15 (AP)—One man was reported killed and two critically burned in an explosion and fire at a crude oil pumping station 12 miles from this east Texas oil town today.

J. M. Windham, filling station operator, said the blast occurred when an oil pipeline at the station burst and became ignited from a trash fire ablaze nearby.

A dozen or more men working at the station, he said, escaped to safety before the blast.

American Woman Again Arrested

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Feb. 15 (AP)—An American woman is under arrest in German-occupied Paris a second time — on this occasion on charges of aiding military fugitives to escape into free France.

She is Mrs. Etta Kahn Shiber, widow of a New York newspaperman, who was released by the German army of occupation after her first arrest in Paris Christmas eve. On that occasion, no charge was announced.

CLOTHING RATIONS SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 15 (AP)

Rationing of shoes, woolen clothing and leather goods will start in Bulgaria Monday. Clothing stores yesterday were ordered closed for three days on account of a "run" on their stocks.
