League of Women Voters To Hear School Program

An interpretation of the policies of our school system will be the main theme of the interesting program on education to be presented at the general meeting of the Klamath chapter, League of Women Voters, next Monday afternoon, February the seventh, at two o'clock in the small room of the city library. Mr. J. Percy Wells, superintendent of the city schools, will speak on "The Educational Policy of Our School System," and Mr. Andrew Collier, president of the city school board, will present "Problems of the School Board of the City Schools." The government and education study group is in charge of the program.

The education study group of the league has been interpreting the general educational policies as well as the local, and this program comes as part of its local interpretation under its present program of study, "Know Your School System." This 1940-1941 project is an intensive series on the elementary educational system, and is carried on in the traditional league method of Go See. The purpose of this study is to give league members a picture of their local schools and lead them to a wider interest in public education in the country as a whole. Remembering that "The National League of Women Voters exists for the political education of women through active participation in government," the project "Know Your School System" serves as a direct preparation for work on government and education.

This group's present interest in interpreting the school system to the public comes as a culmination of three years of study on: school finance; the cooperation of the family and the community with the schools; and the study the group made on schools last year under their "Know Your County" plan.

Also at Monday's meeting, Mrs. H. P. Bosworth will present the pros and cons of the present legislative bills pertaining to the schools.

A cordial invitation is issued to all women who are interested in our educational system, whether members of the league or not, to attend this educational meeting.

Other facts brought out were that growth in population has been rapid, due to the development of the lumber industry in a large measure; about twenty per cent of the population is foreign born and many nationalities are represented, but the proportion of the population which does not speak English is practically nonexistent; there are regular classes for aliens who desire to become citizens; potatoes grown here are world famous and exported in large quantities; among new crops sugar beets and sugar beet seed have an increasing importance, and Klamath county has produced a record crop of bent grass seed.
