

NEGRO FOUND UNCONSCIOUS NEAR TAVERN

Brownie McNeal, negro porter at the Hall barber shop, was brought to the county jail Sunday morning by two strangers who said they found McNeal lying in a ditch near the Embassy club. McNeal was unconscious when brought to the jail, and his benefactors left immediately without supplying further information.

McNeal was not seriously injured, and quickly recovered. He was back on his regular job Monday, but could supply officers with little information as to the incidents of Sunday morning. He told Sheriff Low he had played the drums at the Embassy club Saturday night and Sunday morning, and could faintly remember some one pushing him over a bannister on the club porch.

Sheriff Low went to the spot where he believed McNeal had been manhandled, and there found 69 cents and other personal effects lying in the grass. The negro said he believed he had \$3.85 in his pockets Sunday morning, but he could find none of the change after being left at the jail.

Three Reported Held in Nevada For Car Theft

Three men, an Indian named Baptiste, Eugene O'Neill, and Rufus Bliss, are reportedly held in Las Vegas, Nev., in connection with the theft of a car stolen from Klamath Falls the night of February 11.

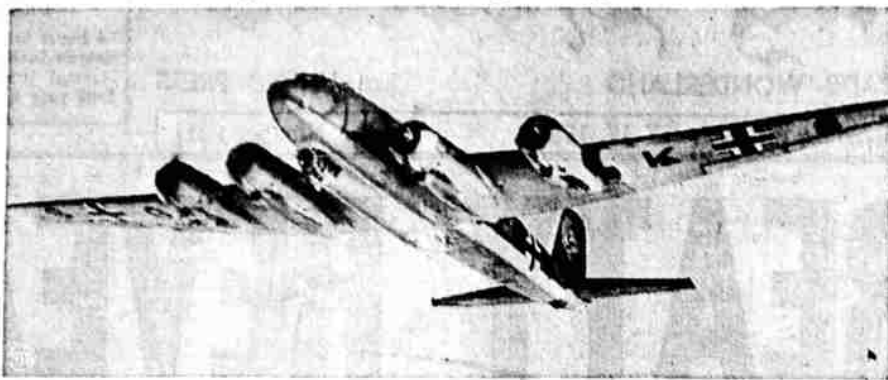

heavy employment in regular industry this year and a shortage of relief labor. It is now apparent that the army engineers will proceed on a contract basis for the CAA part of the development program.

Separate Plans

The army engineers have set April 1 as tentative date for calling for bids on the Klamath airport.

In a press release, the army engineers made the following explanation of the work to be done here and elsewhere:

"This CAA program is an entirely different item from the military program, under which six airports throughout the northwest area will be garrisoned by air corps troops in the near future. Under the military program, cantonments, adequate to house approximately 2500 air corps troops and officers, are currently being constructed at McChord field, Snohomish, Sunset field near Spokane, Portland-Columbia, Pendleton and Boise.

"Under the CAA program, which involves essentially only the grading, draining and paving of airport runways to the length and width which will permit the landing of fast military aircraft, the work is being handled in some instances by the corps of engineers of the army and in other cases by the WPA. The work at those fields being handled by the corps of engineers (including Klamath) will in each case be done by contract, after full advertising of the specifications, with invitation for bid.

Taking No Title

"Under this program of airport development, the military are taking no title to the fields, are erecting no structures whatsoever and, for the present at least, are making no provisions for garrisons at these fields. . . . Under this program the communities concerned have procured the lands necessary. . . . The communities further have agreed to maintain and operate the airports as public airfields for a period of 25 years. In turn, the communities fall heir to the improvements placed thereon by the federal government. The army has the right to use the fields in event of an emergency, and to this extent the national defense is served, through the provision of a greatly increased number of fields capable of handling military aircraft if and when needed."

Allen (D-Multnomah) to provide that members of county courts shall constitute the county public welfare commissions, removing the four members appointed by the governor. There now are seven members on each commission—the governor's four appointees and the three county court members.

under 18 years of age to play, roam upon, loiter or to be found upon the streets, alleys, or ways of the city of Klamath Falls after the hour of 10 o'clock at night. Provided, that this section shall not apply if such child is accompanied by parent or guardian, after said hours above specified, or if such child be upon the streets, alleys or ways of said city, after the hour above mentioned, on a mission of mercy and be actually executing such mission.

The mayor and city police department are asking for the cooperation and the help of all parents, and adults in the enforcing of the curfew law.

LONDON, Feb. 17 (AP)—The Turkish-Bulgarian non-aggression accord was regarded by authoritative British sources today as a matter solely concerning these two countries.

These informants pointed out that Turkey for some time has been trying without success to restore friendly relations with Bulgaria, her neighbor.

They derided reports that such an agreement would remove any difficulty for the Germans should they cross Bulgaria in an effort to force Greece to make peace with Italy.

Moreover, it was assumed here that Turkey was not going to do anything under the agreement which would limit her freedom of action in connection with her mutual aid treaty obligations to Britain.

BERLIN, Feb. 17 (AP)—The Turkish-Bulgarian accord was considered in German government circles tonight as a feather in the Reich's cap.

"This move," said one government spokesman, "can certainly be considered a great success for those who have been working toward consolidation and mutual understanding in the Balkans."

Few questioned the bill's prospects for enactment.

It was a rough game with two knockouts in the third period. Hill was knocked out in a collision and Louie Holmes of Portland reentered a previous fracture in his nose during the crash and was forced to leave the game temporarily.

Army Families Take Transport From Manila

MANILA, P. I., Feb. 17 (AP)—Sixty-seven wives and children of American army officers sailed for home today on the transport Etolin.

Although many of the women packed and left on short notice after a Far Eastern war scare swept the Philippines last week, army authorities insisted no evacuation order had been issued.

Other army wives and children were scheduled to sail earlier than they had originally planned, when the transport U. S. Grant sails for the United States later this month and the transport Republic leaves in April.

Many disappointed officers, who had expected to sail with their wives today on routine transfer to other posts, stood on the pier and waved goodbye as the Etolin steamed out. They had been ordered to remain on duty in the Philippines indefinitely.

No official explanation was forthcoming for the sudden cancellation of their transfers. In other circles it was reported the officers were needed here to train more than 5000 Filipino soldiers who have been added to the United States army's Philippines units under authorization of President Roosevelt.

NAVAL MEETING

BERLIN, Feb. 17 (AP)—Grand Admiral Erich Raeder, commander in chief of the German navy, and Admiral Riccardi, Italian under-secretary for the navy, met at Merano, in northern Italy, last Thursday and Friday to discuss naval cooperation of the axis allies, DNB, official German news agency, reported tonight.

UNION DECLARES FENTON EXPELLED

L. H. Fenton, district coordinator and member of the International executive board of the International Woodworkers of America, was expelled as a member of Klamath local 6-12 at a special meeting of the local Saturday, it was announced Monday by Ed Borden, local IWA secretary.

The action was taken due to Fenton's refusal to stand trial on charges preferred against him by local 6-12, Borden said.

Nature of the charges could not be ascertained Monday. Rumors current in the past several weeks have indicated Fenton would shortly leave to become IWA director for the city of New York.

It was Fenton who led the CIO-affiliated IWA in their partially successful strike against the Lamm Lumber company camp last summer in which a compromise settlement was worked out after a three-month logging shutdown.

Fenton has been director of District 6, including southern and eastern Oregon and northern California, for the past several years and has long been a figure in Oregon labor movements.

Borden's statement follows: "Due to L. H. Fenton's refusal to stand trial on charges preferred against him as a local union member of Local Union 6-12, IWA, he was expelled from this union at a special meeting Saturday, February 15, 1941."

HURRICANE IN SPAIN BRINGS DEATH TO 102

were sent from San Sebastian.

Reports from Portugal said hundreds of persons still were missing long after the hurricane blew itself out and it was feared the total of deaths would go much higher.

Portuguese army units were called out for rescue work. The wind was reported to have reached a velocity of 125 miles an hour at Cintra, a town in Portugal a few miles north west of Lisbon.

Among the dead in Spain were said to be 26 persons killed when three coaches of a stalled electric train were blown from a bridge into the Urola river near San Sebastian. The Urola, a small stream, flows into the Bay of Biscay at Zumaya.

In Portugal alone, it was estimated that rehabilitation work would cost 100,000 contos (approximately \$4,000,000).

Crops of olives, almond and pine groves, cork trees and vineyards in Oporto and other sections of Portugal were declared to be virtually ruined.

IWA Votes to Respect Ward Picket Line

The CIO-affiliated IWA, local 6-12, have voted to respect the AFL picket line now ringing the Klamath Falls Montgomery Ward store, it was announced Monday, but disapproved of the manner in which the line has been placed.

Disapproval rests in the fact the IWA does not allow strikes, except by majority vote of the members affected, and hence frowns on attempts to picket non-voting workers from a job. Local Ward employees have not voted a strike and picket lines were laid down as a result of a strike called on a Portland store.

BILL SIGNED

SALEM, Feb. 17 (AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague today signed bills to authorize the state highway commission and the state board of aeronautics to create emergency landing fields, and to permit the highway commission to grant annual permits for log haulers whose loads are more than 50 feet long.

Hopkins Gives Report on Visit With Churchill

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP) The four weeks which Harry L. Hopkins spent in embattled England talking to her leaders gave President Roosevelt up-to-the-minute, first hand information today of the status of Britain's struggle with Nazi Germany.

Carrying a black brief case, bulging with data, Hopkins got back to the White House last night, not many hours after he stepped ashore in New York from a trans-Atlantic plane. He saw Mr. Roosevelt almost at once, and the belief was that his trip would be the subject of a number of further conferences.

Hopkins, sent abroad by the president in the extraordinary capacity of personal representative, was guarded about the purpose of his trip and none too specific about his findings.

Asked whether his special assignment in London was "only a mission of observation," he answered cryptically: "It was more than that."

Police Cracking Down on City Motor Violators

City police are "cracking down" on the tardy motorists, the over-parkers, the double-parkers, and those who occupy no-parking zones, it was announced this week. Fourteen men and women presented the little flixless slips at the desk sergeant's window Monday morning and added so many dollars to the city coffers.

ON TRIAL

NEW YORK, Feb. 17 (AP)—Capt. George V. Richardson, commanding officer of the United States liner Manhattan which went aground off West Palm Beach, Fla., last month, was put on trial today on two unspecified charges before an inquiry board of the bureau of marine inspection.

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
