Britain Chose Bardia Instead Of Beef, Report

LONDON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Food Minister Lord Woolton told the House of Lords today that Britain had chosen "Bardia instead of beef" and warned that "greater restrictions" on diet were coming because of the loss of food ships to submarines.

When the decision was made to rush troops to the Mediterranean, he said, the government took as transports vessels "which were in the habit of bringing meat to this country. . . . We had a choice of beef or Bardia."

The food ministry sees "no possibility of getting those ships back while the Mediterranean campaign goes on," he added, and no chance of raising the meat ration from the current 23 cents worth a week per person.

Cave-in Smothers Two Youngsters

GRAND COULEE, Wash., Feb. 18 (AP)—The cave-in of a basement under construction claimed the lives yesterday of Lyle Keister, 5, and his brother, Elton James, 3, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Keister. A third boy buried in the cave-in, was revived at the Mason City hospital.

The three boys were playing in a basement being dug beneath the Hanson home. Earl E. Hanson, Edward's father, dug the three boys out by the time of the cave-in. The Keister boys had smothered to death.

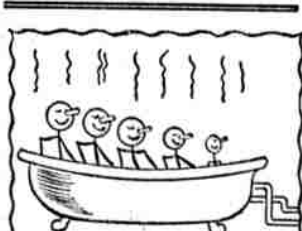
Klamath Women To Attend Meet At Medford

JANUARY BIRTHS OUTSTRIP DEATHS

The stork dropped 72 bundles from heaven in Klamath county during the month of January, 1941, far outdoing the efforts of that tireless bird during January, 1940, when but 49 births were reported.

Deaths during the past month totaled 40, as compared to 34 for the month of January, 1940. Figures were obtained from Dr. Peter H. Rozendal of the Klamath county health department.

Britain Reveals Death Toll From January Bombs

LONDON, Feb. 18 (AP)—The ministry of home security announced today 1502 civilians were killed and 2012 injured by air raids in Great Britain during January.

The civilian toll of the war since June 18, 1940, (when the battle for Britain began) was announced last Jan. 20 as 23,081 dead and 32,296 injured.

Of those killed in January 720 were men, 576 women and 189 children under 16, the announcement said. The injured included 1171 men, 672 women and 158 children under 16. Twenty-six of those listed as killed were unclassified.

This compared with a December toll of civilian casualties totalling 3793 killed and 5044 injured.

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HEALTH MEET HEARS KLAMATH'S REPORT

Klamath county's dairies and packing plants compare favorably with any seen in California, according to a report made before the city board of health at a luncheon Monday in the Pelican cafe. Dr. J. Calvin Hunt, city meat and milk inspector, has recently returned from making a survey of such plants in the south and said Klamath could report excellent conditions existing here as compared to other places.

General problems facing the board were discussed. Among those present were Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer, and William Bruce Davis, county sanitarian, asked to sit in with the board.

Company Asks Court for Fine On Truck Charge

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 18 (AP)—The Silver Eagle Trucking company of Portland not only entered a plea of guilty in federal court to a charge of violating the motor carrier act of 1935 but it requested the court to impose a fine.

Julius Gaussoin, president of the corporation through his attorney, told the court "carelessness and ignorance in our office caused us to break the law. We did not know that we broke the law but trust that a fine imposed on us will have a good effect on the industry."

Judge Lloyd L. Black followed Gaussoin's recommendation and fined the company \$750 but he suspended \$450 of this amount.

The company was accused of carrying petroleum products for a price different from that set forth in the federal rate schedule.
