OREGON ASKED TO ADOPT HOSPITAL

Local headquarters of Bundles for Britain received an urgent wire Wednesday asking for funds and equipment for eight bombed hospitals in London. The telegram quoted a New York headquarters request that Oregon adopt one children's hospital.

The telegram follows: "New York wires as follows: 'Most distressing cable received from London telling of eight hospitals in dire need, through bombing, of assistance to carry on brave work. Equipment and money needed. Could Oregon adopt one hospital caring for children? Local executive committee ready to undertake aid to children's hospital. Hope for your cooperation in raising money and supplying children's clothes. Please do not fail us. Full credit to be given in New York to each Oregon branch.'"

The telegram, received by Mrs. W. J. Dinmore, president of Bundles for Britain here, was sent by Isabella Gauld, state chairman.

Mrs. Dinmore stated that any contributions or money or children's clothes should be left at headquarters, 419 Main street. Contributors should indicate that the donations are for the hospital fund, she said.

Dog, Cat Meat Reported Sold

BRUSSELS, Belgium (Via Berlin) Feb. 19 (AP)—The sale of dogs and cats for food in the Brussels region has been reported by independent investigators and the government food control bureau is investigating. Meat from these animals has been reported prepared in various forms, one method being to grind and mix it with lard oil. Some also has been canned. Food control bureau agents have arrested a merchant accused of adulterating flour with gypsum.

Klamath Erosion Control Approved

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—The interior department has approved soil and conservation investigations to select a few western reclamation projects for erosion-control work. Secretary Ickes said \$78,200 had been allocated for the investigations. The Owyhee project in southwestern Idaho and eastern Oregon; the Vale project in Oregon; the Klamath along the Oregon-California line have been listed for investigations.
