

## MINOR ACCIDENTS OCCUR AT CRATER

CRATER LAKE—While skiing at Crater lake Sunday, Mary Aranja of Klamath Falls received a possible fracture of her left knee by a fall on skis at the upper end of the ski bowl. Treatment was given by Ranger Folles and members of the ski patrol. Herb Berry, Ed Chubb, Tom Welch, Bill Clark, Marion Stoum and Mark Clark. Miss Aranja was then taken to Klamath Falls to a physician.

Raymond Blair of Gold Hill, Ore., ran a leather punch knife blade through the first finger of his right hand while punching a hole in a leather ski binding. This happened in the parking area at the rim of the crater. First aid was given by Ranger Frost.

L. B. Vaden of Klamath Falls received a sprain of the right knee by a fall on skis on Knob Hill. Treatment was given by Ranger Frost.

A minor automobile accident was reported here Sunday involving Hillman W. Russell of Grants Pass and Lewis E. Conger of Medford. The accident occurred about a mile from headquarters on the road to the rim of the crater. The only damage was badly bent fenders.

Another car accident occurred Monday about two hundred feet south of the Anna Springs checking station, involving J. Vinton Scott of Salem, Ore., and George L. Jantzer of Trail, Ore. The cars skidded into one another, causing dented fenders.

## Tips On Your Income Tax

If Wife Works Put Her Name on Return  
As It Appears on Employer's Payroll

The fourth of six short articles outlining the most common errors of income tax payers.

This year's are really the first income tax returns in which social security taxes figure. So remember this: What has been deducted from your pay for social security taxes is part of your pay, and is taxable. So, in figuring your pay, include the deductions for social security taxes, even though you didn't get the money directly. The government regards these deductions as your savings, and they are taxable. So don't try to deduct them. The phrase "income tax paid at the source" has been a cause of confusion. Some people who



paid 1939 income taxes in 1940 want to deduct that amount on their 1940 return, thinking that is what is meant by "income tax paid at the source." It isn't that at all. There is no deduction allowed for the income tax you pay to the federal government. "Income tax paid at the source" refers to certain bonds and dividends from which the company paying them deducts income tax payments before they pay you. If both husband and wife make a return, be sure the names are the same as those on the payrolls where both work. For instance, a man makes a return for John Jones and his wife, Susie Smathers Jones. Susie works. The joint return should include what she makes, too. But maybe Susie is coy about her marriage and is on the payroll as Susie Smathers. So when the revenue people check up, they look for Susie Smathers' return, and there isn't any. They have no way to know that she is Susie Jones. So to save yourself and everybody else a lot of trouble, be sure that your name on either a joint or a single return coincides with the payroll records.

## Trade Group Opposes WPA Projects Here

Following a lead set by the Portland Building Trades council, the Klamath Falls council in a regular meeting Monday night adopted a resolution opposing WPA labor on construction projects in the basin area. A similar resolution was passed in Portland recently. Klamath workers based their action on the difference in prevailing wage scales of the WPA and the local union and on the psychological influence believed exerted on WPA workers remaining in relief work instead of seeking jobs in currently booming private industry.

## Lawmakers Argue Over Salary Increase Bill

SALEM, Feb. 19 (AP)—Rep. Warren Edwin (D-Multnomah) brought to the house Tuesday morning a bill to increase the salary of the Lincoln county treasurer from \$8000 to \$12000 a year. He was the only member who voted against it.

Erwin objected in a five-minute oration to further county increases while the legislature "refuses to see the green light on pensions." Rep. Frank J. Lonergan (R-Multnomah) said "My colleague has overlooked the green light, but he hasn't overlooked the white light of publicity."

When Rep. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Multnomah) asked "Do you reserve the right to change your mind when the legislators' pay increase is submitted to the people?" Erwin responded he would take that under "serious consideration."

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## Klamath Late in Response To Wonderland Theme Plan

## AIR WELLS

Already successfully used in southern France, air wells operate on a principle the same as that of an ice-filled pitcher, on which water condenses. At night, cold air enters the dome of the "air well" through a central pipe and circulates through the interior core, chilling it thoroughly by morning. ## Tuition Grants Offered By SOCE To High Grads

SOUTHERN OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Ashland (Special) — The Oregon state system of higher education is again offering scholarships to high school seniors who plan to enroll in any of the schools in this system. These scholarships will be available to students planning to attend the Southern Oregon College of Education during the school year 1941-42.

Graduates of high schools who rank in the upper third of their high school graduating class, who need financial assistance, and who are recommended by the high school principal and by the high school faculty committee on scholarships are eligible to apply. The scholarships amount to \$25.50, out of a total of \$57.50, which is the amount of tuition and fees for one year at the Southern Oregon College of Education.
