TULELAKE — Only a few of the 6700 muskrat skins offered for sale at the Tulelake biological headquarters Tuesday afternoon were sold, trappers holding for a higher price than the \$1.85 offered, according to B. C. Shultz, president of the recently organized Northern California Trappers' association.

The association plans to again offer skins for sale, probably on March 1. Fewer buyers were on the ground Tuesday than for the first sale, held a week ago when over 3000 skins were disposed of.

Skins will be taken until February 28. The association has at present 42 members, 14 of whom are trapping on government land in the refuge.

New Circular Out On Ills of Lawns

Numerous inquiries from the Oregon State college plant pathologists about this time of the year regarding various diseases of lawns. In answer to these, Dr. C. E. Owens, plant pathologist for the experiment station, has just revised an old circular of information entitled "Turf Diseases and Their Control." This revised circular, No. 234, explains the symptoms of such parasitic diseases as brown patch, dollar spot, spot blight, snow mold, and fairy ring, and gives the type of control for each that has been found most effective in this state.
