where Britain will fight us we will fight them and destroy them."

(Last Wednesday, Drew Middleton, Associated Press correspondent in London, wrote that neutral naval sources there predicted Germany would unleash a great undersea offensive this spring with 600 submarines, either to prepare the way for invasion of England or to provide a temporary substitute for Hitler's promised assault.)

The "strongest cooperation" bound Germany and Italy, he said, a combination that should not be ridiculed by the enemy.

"They will know shortly, when our new types of submarines are going to be brought into the expanded warfare," he said. "They will find out in March and April what German-Italian submarine cooperation will mean to them."

Hitler, giving thanks that he was hale and hearty and able to lead the fight, remarked that he felt "that spring is in the air."

He spoke for nearly an hour and a half, progressing from a recital of achievements of the national socialist party to an oratorical outburst capitulating future war plans.

"Our battles at sea can only begin now. The reason was that we wanted to school the new U-boat crews for the battle to come."

Every nation—including the United States—must realize that Germany is an "immensely powerful factor" in world economics, Hitler said in a warning that Germany must be "reckoned with."

"We are going to do business solely on the basis of German advantage," he asserted. "If it's good for Germany, we shall trade, and no American or British interests are going to put a stop to our way of doing business."

"We must be reckoned with and whether we deal on an exchange basis or not that is no business of any international, New York or London bankers."

Pension Boost — With two dissenting votes, the house passed and sent to the senate a bill to change the maximum on old age pensions from \$30 to \$40 a month, but there is no provision to increase the amount of pensions.

Those voting against the bill were Reps. James A. Rodman (R-Lane) and Giles L. French (R-Sherman).

Rep. A. Rennie (R-Benton) said the bill was in line with federal security requirements and possibly would enable the state to obtain increased federal aid.

Sen. Lew Wallace (D-Multnomah) introduced a bill to permit increase in weight of logging trucks from 54,000 to 68,000 pounds. Wallace said the bill would help Oregon's logging industry. The senate last week killed a similar measure that would have affected all trucks.

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INDIAN OFFICE URGES STATE TO FIX ROAD

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—

The Bureau of Indian Affairs told Senator McNary (R-Ore) in a letter today it believed rebuilding or repair of the Sprague River road through the Klamath Indian reservation was "more a state obligation than a local one."

The bureau said surveys had shown 200 cars a day passed over the road and added the number would be increased if the road was put in good condition.

It said neither the bureau nor Klamath county had the necessary funds, \$300,000, to repair the road and said the cost should rest upon the state. The bureau recited that in 1931 the Klamath tribal council and Klamath county agreed to put up not less than \$25,000 each to construct 20 miles of the road with the county agreeing to maintain it.

It said that though the Indians had complained about the condition of the road it had not been properly kept up and while the county recognized its obligation it argued that the road had gone down so much from neglected maintenance there was not much of it left to maintain.

The bureau urged the county, and state get together and see if some federal funds could not be allocated by the state to the improvement.

tune? Don't you realize it is against Germany?"

"His face was livid with rage. I tried to hold my temper. I replied as courteously as I could that I liked the tune, that Bulgaria was a neutral country, that I intended to do and say what I pleased."

"His face became contorted with anger. Then he reached for an empty wine bottle on his table. I quickly stepped back and threw up my hands to protect myself."

"The bottle, which the German threw at close range, struck me on the forehead. A bruise which later appeared was more than six inches long."

"This sudden, vicious, unprovoked attack irritated me considerably. I also faced the necessity of defending myself against further vicious attacks, so I smashed him in the face, knocking him down and causing his face to bleed."

"My friends at this point suddenly grabbed me and pushed me into a small adjoining room. All Bulgarians present also rallied to my side and helped protect me. The German was joined by a great many other Germans in civilian clothes, who rushed to his side from various parts of the restaurant. They made many attempts to charge through the wall of Bulgarians standing in front of me, but each time without success."

"It was one hour later that order finally was reestablished enough so we could leave the restaurant and go to the American legation."
