WATER PLENTIFUL SURVEY REVEALS

Klamath's lakes and streams were well filled with water while hills held a goodly supply of snow to promise adequate moisture for the coming growing season, a check with the US weatherman proved Monday after a weekend of varied weather including rain, snow, and menacing clouds. Total precipitation for stream year is far above normal with 9.50 inches recorded up to Monday morning as compared to the usual figure of 7.77 inches. Last year's 10.28 inches has yet to be passed, however. During the night 21 inches of rain and snow fell in addition to Sunday's 15. Maximum temperature Sunday was 46 degrees, the minimum Monday morning chalked up at 31.

Two inches of new snow fell on Sun mountain Sunday night according to the state highway department and snow plows quickly moved this amount. It was also snowing lightly on the Green Springs during the night although the fall was not heavy enough to hamper traffic.

Local Red Cross Sends Five Boxes For Britain

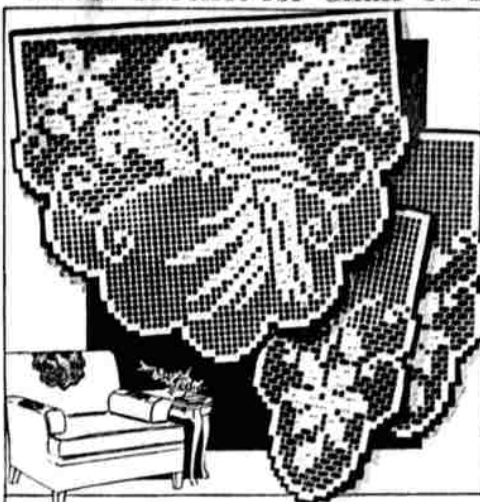
