Indian Officers, Foresters Hold Fire Control Meeting

A talk on the duties of forest officers and timber operators in connection with fire protection on Indian reservations sparked the morning session of an all-day conference of Indian officers, timberland owners and logging executives at the Willard hotel Tuesday.

The address, by Patrick Gray of the Spokane regional office of the U. S. Indian service, brought into focus the purpose of the meeting which was called by the Indian service in an effort to reduce the growing annual timber loss on the Klamath Indian reservation. G. S. Kephart, Indian officer at the reservation, presided.

Gray's talk was followed by a review of pending legislation affecting fire preventive measures by C. C. Williams, inspector for the state board of forestry.

Other addresses were given by R. W. Taylor of the Indian service, A. R. Blocklinger, Chilquin Lumber company, and H. R. Ogle of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

The conference, not intended for direct action along the lines of blaze prevention, served only as a round table for discussion of problems confronting the three entities directly concerned with reservation fires, Officer

Kephart said. Action on views aired in the conference will probably be taken through committee findings in the near future, according to Kephart.

Main problems before the conclave were the prevention of man-made fires which in the past five years have been responsible for 75 per cent of reservation blazes. Among those cited in the morning gathering were those brought on by hunters, lumbering, smokers and brush burning.

Chief cause for the increasing timber acreage loss in the past two years has not been a large number of fires but the spread of blazes once started, it was said. This was ascribed primarily to the small reproductive timber growth which has sprung up in cutover land.

Before logging the virgin timber stands were free of brush and small ground fires were more liable to burn themselves out before attacking the bigger trees, Kephart stated. With the inception of reforesting methods and new ground-covering growths, ample fuel was provided to carry small fires up the taller timber.

The conclave was scheduled to convene again for an afternoon session and take up further protection problems.

Laundry Workers Report Progress In Negotiations

Negotiations between Klamath Falls laundry workers and employers over the 10 per cent wage increase asked by the workers through their AFL-affiliated local union were reported Tuesday to be progressing satisfactorily and indications were an agreement would be signed by Tuesday night.

Laundry employees last month asked for a blanket 10 per cent pay boost, privileges of hiring through the hall, seniority rights and a minimum reporting time of two hours. The matter has been under consideration by both parties since then with several counter-proposals offered from each side.

Terms of the near-agreement were not known Tuesday, but it was supposed the eventual settlement would come in the form of a compromise.

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nazi invasion, emphasizing particularly the destruction of the Czech educational system.

"In Czechoslovakia, we prized our education above all else," he said. "The university at Prague was established in the fourteenth century. It continued without interruption until 1939. The Czechs are now deprived of all facilities of higher education."

"On the night of November 17, 1939, all the dormitories and places of residences of Czech students were surrounded. They were taken in their night clothes to the airport, where they remained in the bitter cold."

"Then, 132 students were selected at random, taken across the field, and executed by a firing squad. Of the survivors, those over 20 were taken to labor and concentration camps. Parents of missing students were warned not to inquire as to their whereabouts."

Dr. Munk said that 400,000 Czech men have been taken from their families for forced labor.

"In this year of 1941, there has been revived the institution of slavery," he said. "In Europe, 150,000,000 people are white slaves, deprived of their liberty and their rights."

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the army camp when the commissioners were massacred. The impressions he received were indelibly stamped on his mind and he later incorporated them into his book, along with the account of the war as he had heard it from Indians who had taken part.

In company with his father and mother, Captain O. C. Applegate and others, he toured the United States in 1876 under the guidance of Meacham who was attempting to plead the Indians' cause. He often spoke with pride of having met such men as General U. S. Grant, Wendell Phillips, Henry Ward Beecher and J. C. Ridpath.

Riddle's life was spent on the Klamath reservation near Sprague River where he married the daughter of Chief Schonchin, brother of Schonchin John, who was hung at Fort Klamath at the close of the Modoc war. He raised cattle and horses, taking an active part in reservation affairs, and quickly winning his way to the friendship of those who knew him.

URGES TOWNSEND PLAN

LAKEVIEW, Ore., (To the Editor)—The Lakeview Townsend club urges enactment of Townsend national recovery plan, now before congress into law. By unanimous vote, the following was sent to President Roosevelt and Oregon senators and congressmen who are unanimous and was for its enactment into law in 1935. Except Mrs. Nan Honeyman who voted to bring it on the floor of the house for debate which was ever denied by administration. We respectfully petition each of you to promote legislation and enactment into law the Townsend national recovery plan, now before congress as H. B. No. 1036 which bill has same fundamentals as of January 1935, in H. B. No. 3997 which was never allowed its constitutional rights for debate on the floor of the house, although supported by 10 million signatures of America's best citizens, as an appeasement administration substituted the social security act which has definitely been proven deceptive fraud to the aged and youth as well as national economic tragedy. The defendants were charged with endangering the Netherlands and her population, but no further details of the organization or the trial were disclosed.



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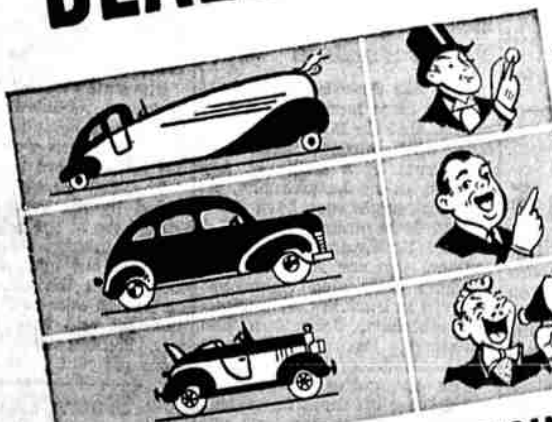
