

COUNCIL ASKED FOR 'JUKE BOX' FEE REVISION

Along with other ordinances the city of Klamath Falls may have a "juke-box" ordinance within the next week or two. Distributors of coin-operated music boxes have protested the ordinance, which calls for a fee of \$1500 on pinball machines because music boxes fall in the same category. Councilman J. J. Keller's motion Monday night that the ordinance be investigated was seconded by Councilman. It was suggested a fee of \$200 be asked of distributors with \$10 for each additional machine.

Sealed bids on janitor's supplies for the city were referred to the finance committee.

George Duke's request for an additional taxi cab stand at Eighth and Main streets was denied by the council.

Two offers for a piece of property in Second Mills addition were read to members of the council, the bid of C. M. Reynolds for \$750 accepted.

Two property owners protested muddy streets and asked for consideration from the city street department. H. Hartley, 1434 Lakeview street, and H. T. Landrum, 533 North Sixth street, were given consideration and the matters turned over to their respective councilmen.

The airport election slated for March 5 came up for discussion among council members and Mayor Houston asked that a goodly representation of the city's voters turn out for the election.

Mason-Ehrman company was given permission to install a gas tank on property adjoining the plant with a 60-day revocable clause included in the permit.

Maurice Paup was hired by the council as a third employee at the city cemetery to work up to September 1. Paup's pay will be 35 cents per hour during the month of March. Councilman Cantrall asked that the cemetery committee be permitted to purchase hedges on the Lexington street side of the cemetery near Delta street. Permission was granted.

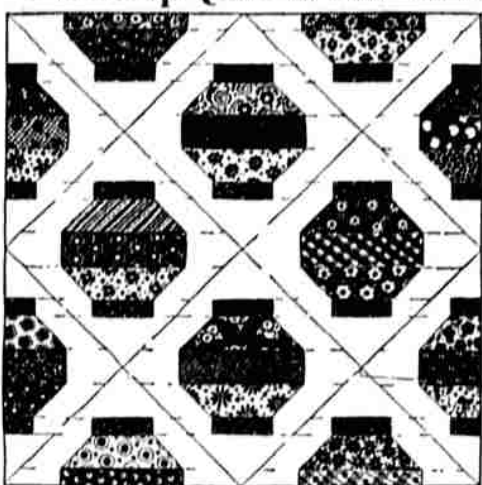
Rent on city owned cabins on Market street, since the houses were repaired, was upped from \$8 to \$10 per month, and those cabins not meeting sanitary requirements will be withheld from rental at the suggestion of Building Inspector Harold Franey.

A no-parking strip for a 300-foot section in front of the Ewauna Box company on South Sixth street was authorized by the council. This will eliminate a traffic hazard and give the lumber carriers the opportunity to travel the extreme right hand side of the street.

SELECTION OF DOG CATCHER POSTPONED

Selection of a county dog catcher was postponed until Friday at a meeting Monday of the county dog commission, composed of Harry Wilson, Jay Fairclo and Jerry McCarl.

It is understood the board several weeks ago received an application from R. O. Fredericksen, former attendant for the Klamath Humane society, and about whom considerable controversy has developed in connection with the city poundmaster appointment. Fred Percy was also mentioned as a possible candidate for the county job.

McCarl, a member of the county board, made a statement adverse to Fredericksen at a meeting of the city council a week ago.

Dog board members pointed out that March 1 is the deadline for 1941 dog licenses, and that penalties will be imposed on and after that date. The regular fee for licenses is \$1.50 for male and \$2.50 for female. They may be obtained at the county clerk's office.

Concrete Pouring Starts on New Service Station

Workmen started pouring concrete on the new General Petroleum station at Walnut avenue and South Sixth street, and by late Monday afternoon had practically completed the South Sixth street sidewalk and base in front of the pumps. This is one of the biggest jobs underway in the business district. At least six service station jobs are under way to be completed by early spring with a check with the building inspector showed.

On Main street two large jobs were progressing satisfactorily, according to Harold Franey, building inspector. One was the corner space at Main and South Sixth street to be occupied by Ricky's Jewelry store and formerly occupied by the Schuss Wine company, and the other is the former Safeway space on Main near Ninth with a section to be occupied by Curran's for Drugs and the remainder by the Klamath Variety store.

Crowd Attends Tax Sale of Property Here

Active interest was evidenced at the tax sale conducted on the courthouse steps Monday by Allen Sloan, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections. The property offered for sale was foreclosed upon recently by the county for delinquencies from 1927 to 1930.

A big crowd of interested persons jammed around Sloan as he took bids on the property on a big table placed on the platform at the head of the stairs. At first, he started the sale inside the courthouse, but the crowd caused such congestion in the hall it was decided to move outside.

Larson operates a 10,000 watt station, HCJB, located in Quito, Ecuador, and known as "The Voice of the Andes." The public is invited to hear the visiting missionary.

Guardsmen Said 'Menial' Workers For Draftees

SALEM, Feb. 25 (AP)—Rep. James A. Rodman (R-Lane) told the house of representatives Monday that he had been informed that members of the Oregon national guard at Camp Murray are being required to do "menial work" for draftees coming into cantonments and suggested it might be a matter for legislative inquiry.

Rodman said that guardsmen are occupying quarters while draftees are being quartered in cantonments.

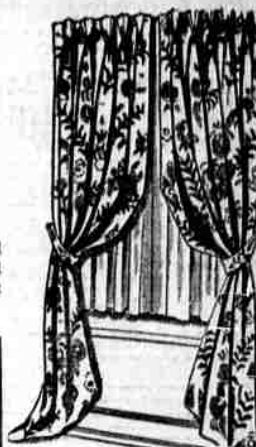
