

MORE BLANKS FOR LEGION'S LIST COMING

Over 300 ex-service men from all walks of life registered in the American Legion defense inventory Saturday, Commander Angus Newton announced.

Registration blanks were exhausted before all who turned out were registered, but Commander Newton said that 100 additional blanks have been ordered and will be available at the M. L. Johnson office, 412 Main street, as soon as they arrive for those who were unable to register Saturday. The men who left their names and addresses will be mailed blanks.

Newton said nearly every nation was represented among the men who signed up but that "all were American citizens and proud of it."

The American Legion inventory will give the organization a complete file of defense abilities of a majority of ex-service men of the World War who may be called upon to fill jobs according to their capacity in event of an emergency in the national defense program.

Commander Newton extended his thanks to those who registered, to Legion members and the auxiliary, and to The Herald and News, a radio station KFIJ and Mrs. Rose Poole for publicity given the drive.

Among old time friends who came to Fort Klamath for the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Walter Monroe, formerly of Fort Klamath, and now residing near Ashland.

Klamath Churches Mark Beginning Of Lent Season

Shrove Tuesday—the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday which is the first day of Lent on the church calendar—was being observed in churches throughout the country this week and the denominations which observe the Lenten season, the period which signifies the 40 days of Christ's fasting before the crucifixion, enjoyed Shrove Tuesday affairs.

In various churches Ash Wednesday services were scheduled, and next Sunday, March 2, is the first Sunday of Lent.

At St. Paul's Episcopal church a pancake supper was to be served Tuesday night, from 6:30 p. m. to 7:30 p. m. There is an interesting story in connection with the serving of the traditional pancake supper. Shrove Tuesday originally included the three days preceding the beginning of Lent. Now, however, Shrove Tuesday is the only one commonly observed. The term, "shrove," indicates that it is traditionally a time for confession and absolution before the holy season.

Pancakes are traditionally served on Shrove Tuesday, the original reason for their great popularity on that specific day being that in their preparation all surplus fat was used up before the Lenten fast. In England particularly there are various rites observed in connection with the serving of pancakes on this day—one of the most interesting being held at Westminster Choir school where the chef still prepares a huge pancake, tosses it in the air, and if the boys catch it as it falls, they may claim a holiday.

In one form or another pancakes are served in the various countries on Shrove Tuesday. The Frenchman, for example, has his "crepe," the Russian his "blini," the Scandinavian his "platter," the Mexican his "tortilla," and the American a good old fashioned pancake.

'Plums' Rapped
By Professor

TILLAMOOK, Feb. 25 (AP)—Samuel Haig Jameson suggested Saturday that administrative jobs in Oregon's penal institutions be filled by the merit system rather than as "political plums."

The University of Oregon sociology professor charged that the institutions were inefficiently managed and condemned overcrowding in the state penitentiary and failure to set up a more complete rehabilitation program for state industrial schools.

He spoke before a joint meeting of the Tillamook County League of Women voters and the Tillamook branch of the American Association of University women.
