UNION PRESIDENT DEFENDS WORKERS

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 26 (AP)—CIO-President Philip Murray told the American Association of School Administrators Tuesday that "if strikes menace the national defense program, it will be due to industry's refusal to allow the worker to raise his living standards."

Remarking that "I speak for the four and a half million members of the CIO," Murray told his 5000 listeners that the greatest bottlenecks likely to develop in the defense program "will come from the fact that the big corporations are grabbing most of the defense contracts."

He continued: "If in America national defense is menaced by industrial turmoil, the condition is altogether attributable to the failure of these great employers to recognize the ordinary needs of men, women and children and their desire to supply themselves with just a little more of the sunlight which God willed them to have."
