

Little Hope Held for Dutton Skiing

Little hope for an early opening of Dutton ridge to Crater lake skiers was held out by Park Superintendent E. P. Leavitt in an address before a regular Crater Lake Ski club meeting in the courthouse Wednesday night.

Nor is there any chance for southern Oregon skiers to bring about the opening of the ranger dormitory or the Crater lake hotel for wintertime accommodations, Leavitt said. Park policy forbids the use of the dorm and use, through any form, of the hotel, a privately-owned building would be unfeasible because of staggering rates, he maintained.

Leavitt's talk was the principal feature of the club's regular semi-monthly meeting.
