## COMPROMISE IN LAUNDRY WAGE PARLEY SIGNED

A compromise agreement between petitioning laundry workers and Klamath laundry operators has been concluded and is in effect, though formal signing has been delayed a few days by the absence of one employer, Joe Willis, business agent of the local union, announced Friday. Women workers have been given a blanket increase of two cents per hour, a modified seniority pact agreed upon, the union granted rights of hiring through the hall and a minimum reporting time of two hours, Willis said. A minimum wage of \$35 per week for washmen for 48 hours work was also agreed upon and wringermen were boosted from \$24 per week to \$25.

The union had asked a blanket 10 per cent wage increase. The two cent boost applies to all women who had previously been making from 35 to 50 cents per hour, and will up paychecks from four to seven per cent. It will be retroactive to February 15.

## Growing of Opium In Oregon Held Not Advisable

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)**—Harry J. Anslinger, commissioner of narcotics expressed the hope in a letter to Senator McNary (R-Ore.) today that no steps would be taken toward growing opium poppies in Oregon.

The senate had sent the commissioner on inquiry from Prof. G. R. Hyslop, head of the division of plant industries of Oregon State college, asking about the possibilities of growing the opium poppies in the state for seed.

The commission said that most of the opium and morphine supply used for medicinal purposes in this country came from Turkey and Yugoslavia and said the narcotic bureau had taken cognizance of the possibilities of a serious interference with the supply of crude opium. He said that in cooperation with the agriculture department the bureau has caused some experimental plantings of opium poppies at various points in the country to determine the suitability of soil and climate.

Anslinger said if such poppies were grown no overproduction could be allowed because of the dangerous potentiality for speed of drug addiction.
