

GARMENT LIST SENT CHAPTER OF RED CROSS

Mrs. C. E. Dennis, production chairman of the Klamath county chapter of the American Red Cross, announced a new quota for garments to be shipped by April 30 has been received by the production department. With the successful completion of the last quota through the efforts of volunteer workers in the county, Mrs. Dennis stated she felt justified in accepting the following quota:

Sixty women's dresses, 32 girls' dresses, 45 layettes, 10 men's sweaters, 60 children's sweaters, 35 shawls, 45 men's socks, 25 mufflers, five afghans, and 24 bed shirts.

Mrs. Dennis said she wished to thank all workers who helped to fill the previous quotas. Most of this work has been done since January 1 and represents many hours of work.

Ten cartons of garments have just been completed and shipped to the New Jersey warehouse, to be sent from there for relief of war sufferers. The cartons contained the following articles: 60 children's sweaters, 20 men's sweaters, 25 shawls, 19 mufflers, 60 pair men's knitted socks, 17 women's dresses, 38 children's dresses, 39 girls' skirts, nine pair men's pajamas, 30 bed shirts and 40 layettes.

If anyone has completed garments or has knitting needles which are not being used at this time, the local chapter would like to have them turned in as soon as possible. It was announced. Chapter headquarters would appreciate receiving buttons for use on dresses, old pieces of yarn to be used by members of the Junior Red Cross for making afghans, or embroidery thread and crochet cotton for layettes.

Long Union to Attend Unions Meet at Fresno

C. D. Long, business agent for the local union of carpenters and joiners, left Thursday to attend the annual convention of the California State Council of Carpenters in Fresno.

Long, as president of the Oregon organization of carpenters, will represent the state as fraternal delegate. He indicated before his departure that a number of trade problems will be taken up at the conclave. One, he said, that of the thousands of non-union carpenters now migrating westward in search of defense jobs, looms as the major problem confronting delegates.

It was believed a resolution aimed at stopping this influx would be passed.

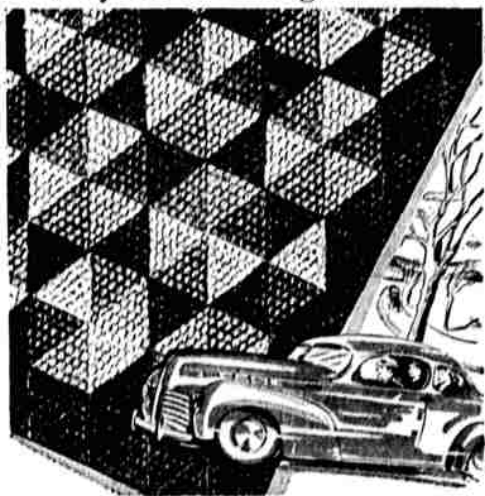

Studying Markets Helps to Buy Wisely in All Seasons

Study the general food market situation if you hope to keep a balance between your own budget and costs of the national defense drive. Here are a few valuable notes from the Consumers' Council Division of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in Washington. In planning menus, keep these facts in mind.

Considerably large quantities of fresh vegetables and much smaller supplies of pork than during the first quarter of 1940 are the two outstanding items in the food picture for early 1941.

Most vegetables probably will be more plentiful and cheaper than in the first quarter of 1940, unless we get unfavorable growing conditions. Largest increases in supplies over a year ago are expected in snap beans, tomatoes, peppers, new potatoes and beets.

PORK SUPPLY SMALLER
Pork supplies still are expected to be from 20 to 30 per cent smaller than the large supplies available during the first four months of 1940. Usually retail pork prices advance dur-

ing the first four months of the year, but in view of the smaller supply, a larger than usual increase is expected this year. Hog prices already have moved up sharply.

Better grade beef is expected to become more plentiful as the year progresses. However, most of this increase in supply over a year ago is expected to come in the late spring and summer.

SURPLUS FOODS LISTED

Egg production has finally dropped below its level of a year ago and the outlook is for supplies to continue smaller than a year ago during most of 1941. Supplies, however, are expected to move up monthly through April, when egg production usually reaches its high point for the year.

The official list of surplus agricultural commodities is important to you. Where there is abundance there will also be lower prices. Use as many of these foods as you can in feeding your family. Here's the official list, as of January 29:

White potatoes, onions (except green onions); apples, pears, oranges, grapefruit; dried prunes, raisins, dried beans; butter, eggs.

pork, lard; corn meal, hominy grits, rice, wheat flour, whole wheat (graham) flour.

BREAKFAST—Orange juice, crisp bacon, hominy grits, muffins, coffee, milk.
LUNCHEON—Tomato juice, corn bread, syrup, raisin cookies, tea, milk.

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Secretary of War Reveals Army Holds 4000 Planes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson has advised the senate foreign relations committee that the strength of the army air corps is now approximately 4000 planes.

Stimson's testimony before an executive session of the senate group was made available Tuesday by committee members after the war secretary had reviewed the transcript and deleted several passages, presumably because of the confidential character of the information involved. The testimony was given during hearings on the British-aid bill.

The regular army air corps, Stimson testified, now has approximately 3700 planes and the national guard, about 300. Slightly less than half are tactical planes, bombers and fighters, he said. The remainder were classified as trainers.

In the course of his testimony, Stimson reported that Great Britain considered her ground defense against aircraft to be "in excellent condition without any help from us."

One British anti-aircraft gun, he indicated, had created a very favorable impression on American technical experts and might be adopted for use by the United States armed forces.

He also informed the committee that virtually all material heretofore transferred to Britain had been "obsolescent, deteriorated or surplus."

The transactions, he said, had been advantageous, in enabling the

U. S. army to order the latest type equipment.

Discussing U. S. air strength, Stimson testified that thus far 1600 of the 3200 army planes authorized in 1939 have been delivered. He said that deliveries during the last two years have totaled 2501 planes, of which 958 were combat ships and 1543 were training planes.

Expense Bill for Legislators Up

SALEM, Feb. 28 (AP)—A bill to pay legislators five dollars a day expenses for 50 days of the present session was introduced in the house Thursday by Reps. J. D. Perry (D-Columbia) and R. C. Frisbie (R-Baker).

The legislators' constitutional pay of \$3 a day expired on the 40th day of the session, February 19.

The bill would appropriate \$25,000 to pay the expenses. The 1929 session enacted a

similar bill, but the supreme court held it unconstitutional. However, a similar appropriation was enacted by the Washington legislature, and was upheld by the Washington supreme court.

LOTS OF PLANETS
