Talk On Dolls Given

Venturists View Interesting
Display by Mrs.
Flock

An outstanding program was enjoyed by the Venture club of Klamath Falls at the dinner meeting on February the eighteenth at the Willard hotel when Mrs. Fred Flock displayed her collection of dolls and gave a most entertaining talk. Among the many interesting facts told by Mrs. Flock were the facts that dolls were not invented for toys but for purposes of use, and that the first dolls were of wood and wax.

An interesting note was struck by Mrs. Flock in her statement that queens of former ages used their dolls to keep up with the fashions, this being one of the first uses for these figures. During the middle ages they were carried through the streets to display the wearing apparel in vogue at that time. Dolls were popular with men and boys, also, being used to plan battle maneuvers and as toy soldiers.

Among royal collectors of dolls were Queen Victoria with her group of 32 jointed wooden dolls made in Flanders and were called "Flanders Babies," representing people of the court and theatre; Mary of England and Marie of Rumania. The latter's collection showed the development of Europe from the year 1500 to the present.

In Japan, dolls are used in political ceremonies, some of these being conducted by boys and some by girls.

The oldest doll in Mrs. Flock's collection is sixty-two years of age. She had dolls from many countries—one from Burma made of banana, a Hindu bride, Russian peasants, hand-carved wooden dolls from Switzerland and Canada; an Irish elf of leather. Others came from Hungary, China, Japan, Mexico, Guatemala, Alaska, Holland, Hawaii and from Liberty's in London, England, were the royal family in their coronation robes.
