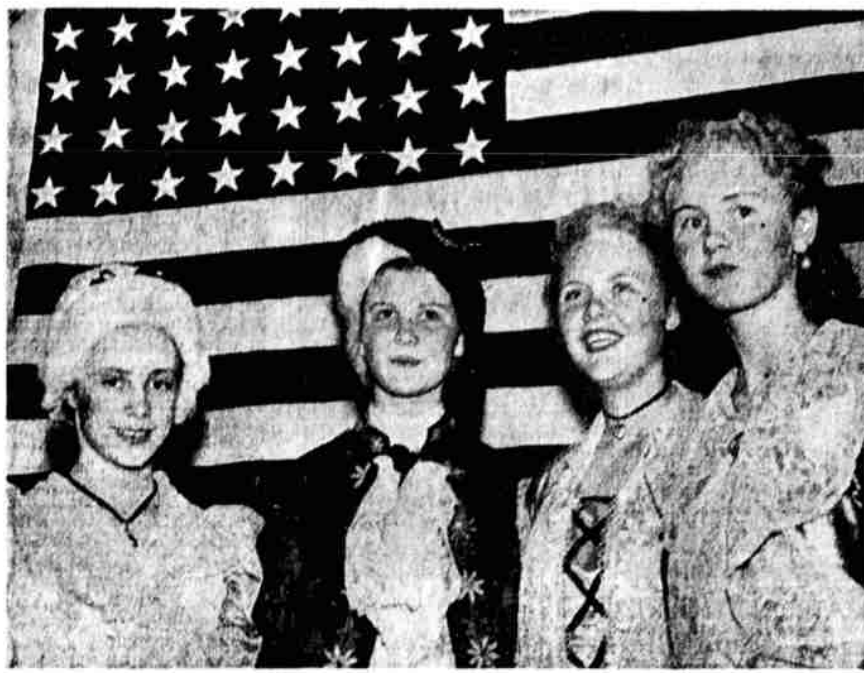
Contest games provided the entertainment with Mrs. Z. W. Dixon in charge. Prizes were awarded to Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Berry.
