

Toastmistress Club Enjoys Alaskan Trip

Mrs. Anne Price Receives Vote of Evening's Best Speaker by Group Monday

"On an Alaskan cruise one does not see measureless reaches of ocean unrelieved and unbroken but rather a smooth and sheltered channel with closely scenic grandeur," said Mrs. S. E. Rife, speaking at the Alaska program of the Toastmistress club Monday evening.

Mrs. J. I. Beard presided as toastmistress and announced "At Last—Alaska," as the subject of the evening's entertainment. Tracing Alaska's history from 200 years ago when a young Danish navigator, Vitus Bering, peered through its fog banked shores and discovered the sea and strait that bears his name, Mrs. Hiram Murdoch spoke on, "History and Development of Alaska." "Today Alaska occupies a strategic position in our defense program and a vital place in the world's history," she concluded.

Mrs. W. R. Boyd had as her topic, "Wild Life in Alaska," and told of the great wealth derived from game. "Sportsmen come from all over the world to hunt, fish and photograph wild life," said Mrs. Boyd. Particularly interesting was her description of the different species of bear found in Alaska.

With Mrs. Katherine Chidester, the Toastmistresses stood and viewed a valley from the floor of which thousands of columns of smoke arose. "This is one of nature's miracles and one of the wonders of the world. The government has made it a national park and called it 'The Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes,'" said Mrs. Chidester.

"The Natural Resources of Alaska" was Mrs. Paul Buck's topic.

Soaring in an airplane over blue glaciers, gaining a bird's eye view of the famous "Yukon Trail," was a high light of the visit of Mrs. Anne Price to Alaska. As she spoke she imparted to her listeners the enthusiasm she enjoyed on her northern cruise.

In the round table discussion which marks the dinner hour of the club, Mrs. W. R. Boyd presided as chairman and introduced the subject, "Hereditary or Environment—Which has More Influence?" "There are those who maintain that a person is so strongly marked by heredity that everything he is or does in life is wholly the result of his inheritance. On the other hand some contend you can mold a life—that a child is so plastic that with proper surroundings and education all for the good or all for the bad is possible," said Mrs. Boyd in introducing her subject. A lively discussion opposing views followed.

Honors for the evening's best speaker went to Mrs. Anne Price. Mrs. Walter Brown, president of the club, presided. Mrs. Brown was appointed candid critic for the evening. Mrs. W. H. Hibbard is club coach and critic.
