

TRAFFIC LIGHT BIDS SET FOR APRIL SESSION

The state highway commission will receive bids on April 3 and 4 for the Klamath Falls traffic signal system, it was learned by The Herald and News Monday through the Associated Press bureau at Salem.

If a satisfactory bid is received and contract let, stop and go signals will go up in Klamath Falls immediately after those dates, highway officials said.

The state is putting up half the cost of signals on state highways within the city, and has charge of contracting for the work. Voters of the city last May authorized a one-mill levy to pay the city's part.

Present plans call for signals at Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth streets, on Main; Sixth street and Klamath avenue; Sixth and Spring streets; East Main and South Sixth street; and Ninth and Pine streets. These are all on the state highways.

In addition, it is planned to install signals on Tenth and Main streets and Eleventh and Main streets on availability of money from the levy. "Electric eye" signals will be installed at Spring and East Main streets on South Sixth street. This device permits traffic to continue without interruption on South Sixth street unless a car is entering from East Main or Spring.

Meanwhile, plans went ahead Monday for further canvass of public opinion on parking meters and parking lots as a solution to the perennial problem of crowded downtown curbsides. It was decided, however, that the parking meter question will not be put up to voters for an advisory opinion at the airport election, but polling of customers of stores, from both in and out of the city, will be carried on.

War Products Freed to British

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Blanket authority was issued today for the export to Great Britain and northern Ireland of 138 key war products, including aluminum and aircraft parts.

The office of the administrator of export control, announcing this, explained, however, a daily check would be kept on the exports of vital commodities so the supply could be choked off if it appeared too heavy a volume was leaving the United States.

In accordance with a federal license order issued by Brigadier General Russell L. Maxwell, export control administrator, the state department notified all collectors of customs that any exporter, without the requirement of an individual license, may export any of the articles on the list to Great Britain and northern Ireland.

ROME, March 3 (AP)—Italy claimed today to have killed or captured a large part of 300 men of the "50th British assault battalion" which, a communique said, was the landing force which seized the Italian island of Castellorosso off the Turkish coast and held it for three days last week.

Klamath Falls dancers, jive fans and ickies were looking forward Monday to the appearance of Duke Ellington, noted Harlem band leader, and his entire 15-piece orchestra at the Klamath armory tonight at 9 o'clock.

The famed composer, instrumentalist and his troupe were to arrive in the city by special bus from Eureka, Calif., late this afternoon.

Ellington's playing date here marks the biggest event in modern dance music in the city in recent years and, if enough local support is shown, may be the inaugural in a parade of big-time name bands appearing here in the future.

Well-known as the orchestra is, Ellington's fame as a composer possibly looms above the transitory recognition of the band. Among the numbers from his pen are "Black and Tan Fantasy," "Mood Indigo," "Sophisticated Lady," and others past and perennially popular.

SEATTLE, March 3 (AP)—The University of Washington swept through both relays and most of the individual events to take the swimming championship of the northern division, Pacific Coast conference, by an overwhelming score. It was Washington's third consecutive championship.

Swimming in their own pool, Washington amphibians ran up 75 points to 53 for Oregon; 16 for Oregon State; 11 for Idaho; 10 for Montana and 5 for Washington State.

Pete Goldberg, with three first places in the free-style events, led the Washington attack. The only firsts not won by Washington were in the 150-yard backstroke, taken by Wetmore, Oregon, and the 200-yard breaststroke, won by Dallas, also of Oregon.

perman (R-Josephine) and Representative Kenneth C. Martin (R-Josephine).

The resolution to investigate the public welfare commission, sponsored by left-wing democrats, also was killed without any discussion.

The committee voted against a bill to provide that the board of control may sponsor construction of armories, but the bill did not provide any appropriation. Committee members said the bill was meaningless because it would not provide funds, and they added that the legislature could not appropriate the \$100,000 because the deficit for the next biennium already totals about \$400,000.

At the same time, the committee rejected bills to provide the building of armories in Baker, Grants Pass, Oregon City and La Grande.

Governor Charles A. Sprague asked the committee to increase his research budget from \$10,000 to \$20,000. Budget Director David Eccles asserting "critical problems" will arise as a result of new industrial development and defense activities. The governor wants to make a study so that adjustments could be made looking toward the time when this defense activity will be over. If nothing is done now, the cost to the state will be vastly greater than this \$10,000 that is requested.

But the committee voted 5 to 4 against the request.

The bill by Representatives J. D. Perry (D-Columbia) and R. C. Frisbie (R-Baker) to appropriate \$25,000 to pay \$5 a day expenses to legislators was killed unanimously. The committee feeling that the bill would be illegal because its effect would be to increase the \$3 a day salary limit. A similar bill, passed in 1929, was held unconstitutional.

The committee also killed bills by Senators Rex Ellis and James A. Best, both Umattilla county republicans, to build a \$35,000 tuberculosis pavilion and a \$300,000 building for elderly patients at the Eastern Oregon State hospital at Pendleton.

Other measures rejected would establish a minimum wage of \$115 a month and a 12-hour day for institution employees. The committee already has approved the 12-hour day, 5-day week in another measure.

Inspectors Begin Dyeing Potatoes For Diversion

Work of dyeing potatoes designated for diversion purposes, started in this district Saturday and members of the inspection service completed 1524 sacks in Klamath, Siskiyou and Modoc counties according to C. A. Henderson, county agricultural agent.

Authorization for diverting some 50,000 bushels of potatoes for feed purposes, are in the hands of officials and now awaiting inspection service.

George G. Cummings, Corvallis, AAA official and clothed with authority from the secretary of agriculture to authorize potato diversions, has arrived in Klamath county and will be here for some time. He may be reached through the county agent's office. Growers having potatoes for diversion are asked to get in touch with Henderson and inspectors.

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Charles Adams, Early-Day Stage Operator, Passes On

Charles Milton Adams, one of the last of the early-day stage coach operators, died Saturday afternoon at Hillside hospital following a lengthy illness. Mr. Adams was a resident of Klamath county for more than 34 years. He was born in Lebanon, Ore., November 15, 1865, to pioneers of the Willamette valley. Mr. Adams' parents crossed the plains several years before his birth.

As a young man "Charley" Adams went into the Paisley country and served as stock foreman for the ZX Cattle company. He trailed cattle from Paisley and Burns to Montague and Gazelle, Calif., shipping point for cattle to the southern market. In 1901, Mr. Adams moved to Jacksonville, Ore., where he operated a livery stable and passenger and mail stage route down Smith river from Grants Pass to Crescent City. That year he married Lilly Leek, daughter of Jackson county pioneers. Mrs. Adams was born in Butte Creek, Jackson county. One son, Clarence, was born at Jacksonville, five other children being born in Klamath county. All survive their parents. Mrs. Adams died in Klamath Falls on November 3, 1937.

Mr. and Mrs. Adams moved to Klamath Falls in 1904, and operated the Belmont Feed company, the yard occupying the property on which the post office now stands at Seventh street and Walnut avenue. In 1922, Mr. Adams purchased a large ranch in the Henley district a short time later and operated the land until 1922 when he opened a general store and postoffice at Olene. Four years ago Mr. Adams retired and has lived in Klamath Falls since that time.

Six children survive including four daughters, Mrs. Louis Robin, Mrs. Clifford Hogue, and Mrs. William LeMasters of Klamath Falls, Mrs. Lester Spannaus of Dorris, Calif., two sons, Clarence of this city, and Chester of West Point, Calif. Two brothers, George of this city, and Oliver of Rogue River, Ore., and one sister, Mrs. Dell Shaw of Portland, also survive.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from Wards' Klamath Funeral Home with interment in the family plot in Linkville cemetery. Pall bearers will be old friends of Mr. Adams including Percy Evans, Syd Evans,

Pete Bour, Roy Kinzman, Louis Robin, and Ivan Kilgore.

House Approves Revised Tax Law

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—A measure designed to relieve so-called hardship cases under the excess profits tax law received final house approval today and was sent to the White House.

Previously passed by the house, it had been amended in comparatively minor respects by the senate and house action today consisted in accepting senate amendments. The senate passed the bill earlier today. One of the senate amendments would permit a corporation to make a return which computed excess profits under both "average earnings" and "invested capital" methods.

German Levy Fine On Dutch Towns For Disturbance

AMSTERDAM (Vla Berlin), March 3 (AP)—The German military authorities fined the city of Amsterdam 15,000,000 guilders (nominally, nearly \$8,000,000) Saturday as a penalty for recent disorders against the Nazi occupation.

The city must pay the money within a week and then collect within six weeks from the inhabitants who are in the \$5000-a-year class. Thus approximately 3000 of Amsterdam's 800,000 citizens will pay the bill.

If the payments are not made promptly, further reprisals will be levied, it was stated.

The towns of Hilversum and Zaandam also were fined a total amounting to about \$1,500,000.

German Consul Seeks Dismissal of Court Suit

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3 (UP)—Capt. Fritz Wiedemann, German consul general, today served notice he will seek dismissal of an \$8000 civil suit filed against him in superior court by Mrs. Alice Crockett, divorced wife of a U. S. army officer.

The notice said Wiedemann will appear in court Thursday, either personally or through his attorney, to argue the superior court has no jurisdiction over consular representatives of foreign countries.

J. W. Ehrlich, attorney for Mrs. Crockett, announced he will file a new complaint in federal court, which has such jurisdiction, if the superior court suit is dismissed. Mrs. Crockett said Wiedemann owed her for services performed on a personal mission to Germany.
