Lots Win Favor

IN the current discussion of Klamath's parking problems, there is evidence of considerable opposition to parking meters but the parking lot idea seems to be generally approved. Both suggestions have been made to the city council by the city planning commission.

What the planning commission proposed was that the city establish one or more large municipal parking lots to go along with the parking meters. The meters would be useful, under this theory, in keeping streets open for short-time parkers, while the parking lot could be used by persons down town for a considerable period to see the doctor, shop, go to a show, etc.

The meter scheme appears to be arousing opposition in the outside areas, and the city authorities cannot well overlook the implications of that sentiment. Further polling should establish definitely how people outside, who trade in Klamath Falls, feel about this proposal.

A number of cities, notably Oakland, Calif., have had much success with municipal parking lots. It would be well to make further investigations of these enterprises in the consideration of a plan that obviously is generally approved by the motoring public here.

One phase of the traffic problem is due for definite action next month when the state highway commission opens bids on the local traffic signal system. Some misunderstanding has developed here by persons who apparently thought the stop and go system was not assured. It was assured by a vote of the people last May, and that issue is settled.

Stop and go signals do not, however, solve the knotty parking problem and that question is still open for thorough discussion. This newspaper welcomes contributions from readers on this subject.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, March 5 —

The recent shakeups in the defense regime were not the last. Another convulsion is coming as soon as the lend-lease bill is sealed, delivered and signed. What form it will take is concealed in the president's mind. Around the largest desks at OPM it is expected Harry Hopkins and Bill Bullitt will be worked into positions of near-cabinet rank.

The new OPM setup seems to be "doing very well," but well is not good enough. Much stronger moves to accelerate production must be taken.

TAX BOOST

If you are tearing out your hair now with your income tax return, you may as well tear it all out and baldly save yourself the trouble next year. A further increase of perhaps one and one-half billion dollars is being conversationally prepared among congressional tax makers.

March 15 returns will be much higher than expected but this is not likely to mitigate the increase. Defense cost is so high and the country so willing that the tax levies want to get all

they can. The boost will be proposed as soon as the returns are in.

Through necessity the legislators are even sidling around toward a sales tax. Lowering exemptions cannot raise much more money. Senator Brown of Michigan estimates it will cost the treasury \$8,000,000 to collect the \$14,000,000 this year from lower exemptions. A 3 per cent manufacturers sales tax would raise \$750,000,000, half of what the boys would like to get.

AFRICAN STATUS

The British have been mightily silent lately about their North African drive. The communiques have been uncommunicative since the capture of Bengasi. Yet no one here has placed much faith in Mussolini's claims that the "British are in a trap," or Berlin accounts of mechanized successes in the interior. Instead, it is believed the British have secretly withdrawn much of their army to ports ready for embarkation elsewhere.

STUPID STALIN

Oaf of all oaves that this war has yet produced is Stalin. The cozy comrade of the Kremlin has negotiated himself skillfully from a position in world affairs to a vassal of Hitler. Stalin made the war possible in the first place by promising Hitler neutrality on the eastern front. He then exposed the totally unsuspected unimportance of his army by his Finnish campaign. He abandoned diplomatic hopes in Scandinavia, the Far East, and now his shortsightedness is
