

WORK ON LAVA BEDS ROAD TO FINISH JUNE 1

Work of improving roads in the Modoc Lava Beds national monument is showing excellent progress and should be completed by June 1, Acting Custodian Don C. Fisher reported Thursday.

Fisher and Project Superintendent C. A. Failing conferred Wednesday with Assistant Park Superintendent Thomas Parker and Engineer George Hopper of Crater Lake national park who inspected projects in the lava beds.

The north boundary road is a little over half completed between Camp Lava Beds and Canby-Cross and the road near Indian Wells station is well along. Landscape Engineer Deuser has a crew of boys at work chiseling out wooden slab signs which will be erected this year.

Another project showing progress is the new, modern lookout station on Schenck butte. Electric wiring is being installed at the present time and the building should be ready for occupancy by June 1. It will be one of the finest structures of its kind, Fisher said.

The 50-cent first entry fee is now being charged cars at the monument, Fisher stated. There is no snow on the ground in the area and squirrels are coming out. Deer that congregated in the monument for the winter are now moving out to higher ground.

The only impassable road in the monument is that from Camp Lava Beds to the Stronghold. Fisher said, and he advised those going to the Stronghold to drive around by way of the petroglyphs on the east side of the Tule lake bed.

Four Separate "Pantries" Built In Refrigerator

Four separate "storage pantries" that permit varying degrees of refrigeration within a refrigerator are a feature highlighted in the 1941 Coldspot now being exhibited in this city.

Mexico Improving Ports on Pacific As Naval Defense

MEXICO CITY, March 6 (AP)—Naval quarters said today improvements already were under way at the Mexican Pacific ports of Salina Cruz and Mazatlan as a corollary to announcement that the United States and Mexico are negotiating a mutual assistance agreement.

Based on the Mexican west coast long have been regarded by the United States navy as important to eliminate the long gap between California and the Panama Canal Zone, it was said. Already, the channel into Salina Cruz, which now can accommodate vessels of 6000 tons, is being dredged for larger craft, sources at the ministry of the navy reported.

A large dry dock, wharves and warehouses are being repaired there, and the railroad that connects the port with Puerto Mexico on the Gulf of Mexico is being improved.

FARM EXPORT HITS BOTTOM DUE TO WAR

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—The world's desperate bidding for "guns instead of butter" has caused the volume of American agricultural exports to sink to the lowest levels since 1889.

Commerce department statistics revealed today that in January American farm exports represented only \$22,000,000 out of a total \$325,355,000 for foreign trade—or less than 7 per cent, according to preliminary figures.

This was even worse showing than the last six months of 1940, when agricultural products declined to only 8.7 per cent of the export total, as compared with 22.4 per cent for the comparable 1939 period.

January exports of agricultural commodities were almost \$4,000,000 less than December's \$25,872,000—indicating the continued decline—and far short of the \$97,000,000 worth sold in January 1940 before Hitler's Nazi legions conquered most of continental Europe.

The combined agricultural and non-agricultural total for the month registered a gain of \$3,000,000 over December, but mirrored the 1940 trend of increased shipments of war supplies at the expense of agricultural exports.

The agricultural slump, commerce department experts reported, resulted mainly from the fact that continental European markets have been cut off by German occupation of many countries, the British kingdom's severe restrictions of imports.

In striking contrast to January, 1940, exports of wheat in January, 1941, dropped to 46,000 bushels against 608,000 bushels; apples to 64,000 bushels against 243,000 bushels; meat products to 4,557,000 pounds against 36,139,000 pounds; flour to 387,000 barrels against 434,000 barrels; and canned fruits to 1,109,000 pounds against 19,412,000 pounds.
