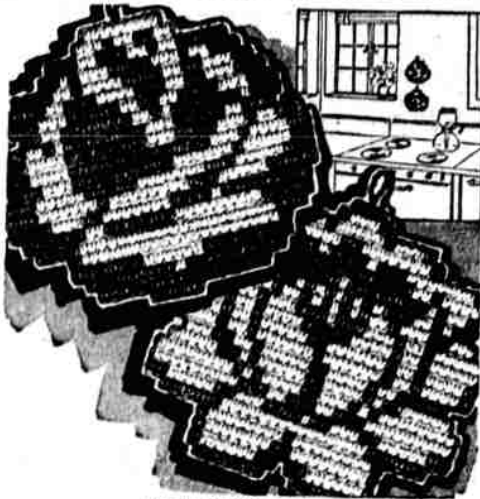
IRA MATHEWS COLEMAN
