

"Precious Bane" To Be Reviewed

Mrs. J. Royal Shaw To Present Mary Webb's Delightful Book to Library Club Members

Mary Webb's delightful book, "Precious Bane," will be reviewed Monday afternoon at two o'clock in the main auditorium of the city library when Mrs. J. Royal Shaw will present the program before members of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club at the regular March meeting.

Mrs. Shaw chose "Precious Bane" because it is so refreshing and in direct contrast to the trend of today when so many dour and heavy books have reached the shelves. Mary Webb has written a story of the time of the Napoleonic Wars with the scene laid in Shropshire, England. She is a master of prose, and her characters live in a pastoral scene of calm beauty. The author died at the age of forty-six in 1927, and "Precious Bane" was written just one year before her death.

Those familiar with the book will be happy to hear Mrs. Shaw's review. Of the six books of narrative and prose written by Mary Webb, "Precious Bane" is considered the most outstanding.
