Vic Townsend Wins Division Point Title

Cross-country Ski Race to Be Held at Crater Sunday

Riding hard on the heels of the Crater Lake ski club's second annual combined tourney came the announcement Tuesday the organization, through the Gun Store, would sponsor a cross-country meet next Sunday in the park at 2 p. m.

The race will begin at the rim and finish at Annie Springs, a distance of about four miles with a 2000 foot drop. All members of the Crater Lake ski club may enter, tournament officials said. Entries may be turned in to the Gun Store, The News-Herald office or to any officer of the club. A trophy for the winner and medals to second and third placemen will be awarded.

Along with the langlauf disclosure came the revelation by the club's tournament committee that a novice slalom race is scheduled for the following Sunday, March 23. All members of the club who have not yet competed in expert races are eligible to enter.

A modified course on Garfield mountain will be laid out with entrants' suggestions and prizes to the first four placemen awarded. A gold cup will go to the winner and medals to second, third and fourth.

Second event on the ski club's revitalized competitive roster next Sunday will be the renewal of Silver Slalom competition, called off last week because of the combined tourney. A no-fall race for women and second men's novice race have been added to the slalom program.

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Klamaths Practice Set Today

Locals Prepare for Opener Against Roseburg Wednesday; Eight Men on Squad

Eight Pelican cagers, title-bound for Salem, pulled out of Klamath Falls Tuesday morning with Coach Dutch French to keep a 3 o'clock practice date with Willamette university's big gym. The lads traveled by car to the state tourney.

In addition to the regular starting five of Reginato, Erlanson, Moses, Bocchi and Love, French carried Swanson, Patterson and Brosterhouse as reserves. Tournament rules permit only eight men to each squad.

First game for the Klamaths will be Wednesday at 3 p. m. against Roseburg's district 4 champions whom the locals slapped down 34-18 in mid-season.

French will billet his boys at an auto camp this year in an effort to avoid the hurly-burly of Salem's main stem which has in the past been blamed for other Pelican squads' hypertensioned fumbling and consequent losses to supposedly inferior teams.

Salem overshadowed the field as Oregon's class A high school basketball teams approached the season's climax—the annual state tournament at Salem Wednesday.

Champions the past two years, the capital city team closed its regular monthly schedule this weekend with a record even more impressive than in 1939 and 1940.

The Vikings, who averaged at least ten more points per game this year than in 1940, won the no name league championship Friday night by drubbing Oregon City in a 59-36 game in which their fleet forwards, Dutch Simmons and Eddie Salstrom, scored 22 and 20 points respectively.

But other teams also looked stronger, notably Klamath Falls and Roseburg from southern Oregon and Columbia prep from Portland.

Klamath Falls, Columbia prep and Corvallis won entry to the tournament this weekend.

Klamath downed Bend, 36-23 and 42-21, for the district 3 title; Columbia prep with all-State Paul O'Toole scoring 21 points, defeated Sandy in the district 13 finals, 44-13; and Corvallis beat Albany, 40-23, for the district 7 championship.

In district 11 Silverton and Woodburn ended their seasons in a tie and a playoff resulted in a Silverton victory.

First round of the tourney Wednesday will see several sectional favorites eliminated. The first game, at 1 p. m., probably will provide the day's highlight—Columbia prep vs. Salem.

Games, following in order, will be:

Beaverton vs. McMinnville.
Klamath Falls vs. Roseburg.
North Bend vs. Parkrose.
Astoria vs. Vale.
Corvallis vs. Eugene.
Baker vs. The Dalles.
Silverton vs. Oregon City.

McMinnville, a team that finished far back in the no name league race, is expected to win over Beaverton, which gained the district 9 title only after a playoff with Sherwood and Forest Grove, with whom it tied in regular play.

The Klamath Falls-Roseburg game is a toss-up. Klamath has the better offensive record, but Roseburg boasts the tallest lineup in the state.

Anita Betting Cracks Record

ARCADIA, Cal., March 11 (UP)—A new all time American race track betting mark was stamped on the records Monday when Santa Anita park closed a 5-day winter meeting with a daily average wagering turnover of \$706,650—more than \$16,170 per day above all existing figures.

Despite the adverse effect of more than a month of continuous rains, the western plant ended its seventh annual season with a total pari-mutuel handle of \$35,988,614. This mark fell only \$561,776 short of the record of \$36,550,390 established by the same track two years ago.

McCarthy Enthusiastic Over Rizzuto, Priddy, Sees Joe Gordon as First Baseman

ST. PETERSBURG, March 11 (AP)—Joe McCarthy is not a man who enthuses easily about a new ball player, because he has handled Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio and has been surfeited with baseball success as manager of the New York Yankees.

So it was little short of amazing to sit on the bench with him and hear him rave about the two youngsters out on the field—Shortstop Phil Rizzuto and Second Baseman Gerald Priddy. Either Joe is softening up or these two really are something special. As practically everybody knows, they came up from Kansas City together this spring.

"If you want to see something pretty, just watch them," he said with something akin to parental pride. "Look at that Rizzuto. How can he miss being popular. He's little but he's strong as a bull—great arms and hands. Just sit here and watch him and Priddy handle 'that ball."

"The beauty of it is that if I didn't have either one of them I'd still have the same club I had last year, and we finished third with the poorest hitting in the American league most of the year and with no pitching to speak of from either Monte Pearson or Lefty Gomez."

"Who is that playing first base—Zeke Bonura?" interrupted a heckler. He got a wintry stare from McCarthy.

"That," said Joe, "is Joe Gordon, and he is plenty of first baseman too. Maybe he's got a few little things to learn about playing first, but it won't take him long—not that boy. All he's got to learn is how to handle his feet, and that's easy for him. He used to be an acrobat."

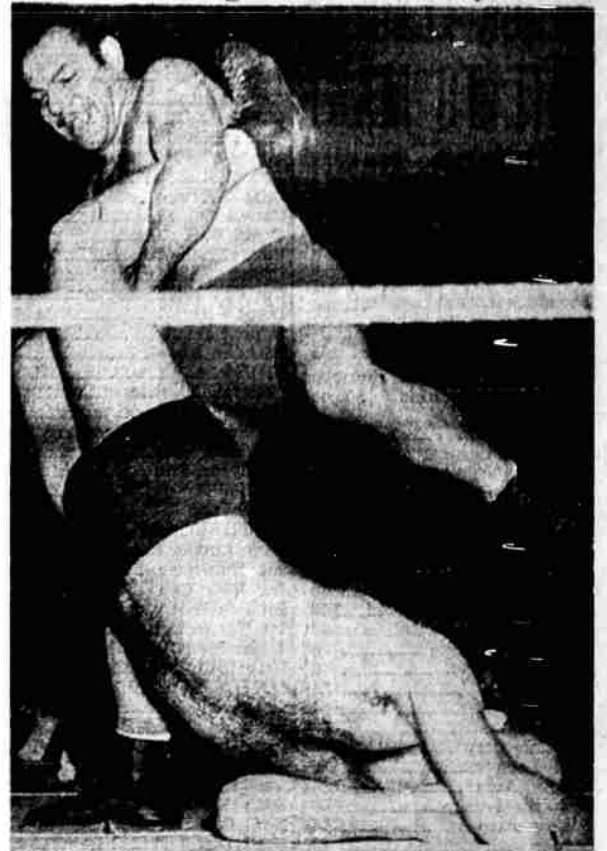
