

MARCH 15 TO BE AUXILIARY INVENTORY DAY

Can you drive a car? Can you render practical nursing care? Can you operate a telephone switch-board? Can you organize entertainment?

These are some of the questions which women of Klamath unit of the American Legion auxiliary will be asked to answer when they register for voluntary emergency service on March 15. The questionnaire which they will fill out asks questions about their availability for emergency service and the types of work they are best qualified to perform.

Four general types of service are listed: outside service, inside service, home service and special service.

Outside service includes such work as automobile driving, providing music and other entertainment, cooking and serving in canteens, and emergency social service activities in caring for the homeless and needy.

Inside service includes, first aid, office work of all kinds, household services necessary in the care of victims of a disaster, and administrative activities in connection with such work.

Under home service are listed sewing, knitting and mending. Special services provide a place for the work of junior auxiliary members, Girl Scouts and other youth groups in messenger and guide activities and traffic direction. Under this heading also comes teaching service for the training of workers in women's war activities.

One copy of the questionnaire will be retained by the local unit and the other sent to state headquarters. A tabulation of the number of auxiliary members available for service in each of the different forms of work will be supplied to the local Red Cross chapter and to city authorities, with whom the auxiliary would cooperate closely in case of emergency. Registration and service will be purely voluntary on the part of the auxiliary members.

Slow Trucks Hit In Bill Offered In California

SACRAMENTO, March 13 (AP)—The pet peeve of many a motorist—slow-moving trucks on highway grades—would be eliminated under terms of a bill by Assemblyman Sam L. Collins, Fullerton, on third reading file in the lower house of the California legislature.

Under terms of the measure, commercial vehicles would be rated as to their ability to maintain a speed of not less than 20 miles per hour over a grade of 3 per cent or more.

Piston displacement in cubic inches would be the "yardstick" in determining whether a vehicle could be operated legally over a "grade zone" as determined by the state department of public works.

For example, a vehicle with a piston displacement of 400 cubic inches would be limited to a gross load of 38,600 pounds on a 3 per cent grade.

For steeper grades, reductions in the permissible gross load would be made.

For easy determination of the vehicle's rating, "grade zone plates" would be issued at the time of licensing, indicating the maximum load which could be transported through any grade zone.

Local Construction Jobs Show Increase for March

One of the largest permits of the week was that granted to W. A. Sellwood for the Klamath Rescue mission to be located at the end of Owens street off South Sixth street at a cost of \$5000. Work was under way this week on the one-story building which will be 48 by 70 feet according to specifications given Building Inspector Harold Franey.

No contract has been let on the mission building but it is understood work and material is being donated. The building is located on lots 13 and 14, block 206, Mills Second addition.

Work was under way this week on an additional dining room in the basement of the Pelican cafe, 722 Main street, with Leo N. Huls, builder, holding the \$3600 contract. The job will be completed within a few weeks it is understood.

B. F. Douglass, contractor, obtained a permit to build a \$5000 home on lot 1, block 41, Hillside addition, for Arthur Moore.

Another permit was issued to C. P. Peyton for the addition to a warehouse in the 800 block on Market street to be used by the Peyton company. The permit called for an expenditure of \$3000.

Ralph Egger of the Northwestern Beauty college was given a permit to do \$1000 worth of remodeling to his building at 234 Main street. A new front and balcony are included in the plans.

Another residence was under construction this week when Maurice P. Kerr was given a permit to construct a \$5000 home on lot 2, block 41, Hillside addition.

Ole Gunderson obtained a permit to make \$400 worth of repairs to a residence at 731 Fulton street.

Foster and Kleiser will construct a \$25 panel poster on lot 11, block 208, Second Mills addition.

Charles S. Schaaf, install awning at 1029 Main street, \$35.

J. A. Biehn, 2611 Scott street, build garage and woodshed, \$50.

Chinese-Russian Pact Reported

SHANGHAI, March 13 (AP)—Local Japanese press circles said tonight they had learned of a secret mutual assistance pact whereby soviet Russia would assist Chinese communists in establishing a Chinese soviet area. They said the accord was concluded at Moscow, March 8, by General Mao Tse Tung, leader of the Chinese communist party. According to this report, General Mao has been in Moscow since February, conferring with soviet leaders.

(The Japanese press recently has been emphasizing differences between the central Chinese government headed by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and the red forces which have been fighting Japan. The Chungking regime has declared that no insubordination would be tolerated.)

Explosion Due To Experiment

PORTLAND, March 13 (AP)—There was a flash in the night and windows rattled around Southeast 36th avenue and Franklin street. Dr. Joseph Beaman quickly explained to city police investigating.

Draft Odds 1-30 For California State Employees

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 13 (UP)—Odds are 30-to-1 against any single state employee being eligible for the draft, according to a report to the state personnel board by executive officer Louis J. Kroeger.

He reported fewer than 1000 of the state's 30,000 employees are eligible.

While a total of 5178 employees reported themselves as possibly eligible for military service, only 769 single men and 142 married men whose wives are working were placed in class 1-A or subject to immediate call.

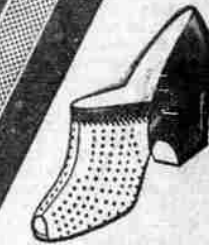
