Honduras Ousts German Aide

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, March 14 (AP)—Christian Zinsner, German charge d'affaires left Honduras today for Guatemala—declared persona non grata by the Honduran government.

Acting under a resolution adopted in the 1940 Pan-American conference at Havana, the foreign office notified the 20 other American republics that Zinsner was unwelcome here as a result of his propaganda activities. He was said to have distributed pamphlets, photographs and copies of Adolf Hitler's speeches.

Also, he repeatedly requested the foreign office to prohibit publication of the book "Yo Fui Camarera de Hitler" (I was Hitler's Chambermaid) and to prevent the press from publishing news and editorials inimical to Germany.
