Man Fined \$10 For Failing to License Dog

A. P. Jacobson was the first offender to be tried in justice court for failure to procure a license for his dog. He was fined \$10 and costs Monday by Justice of the Peace Mahoney.

Judge Mahoney announced that Howard L. Bayne, new county dogcatcher, is vested with authority to arrest persons possessing unlicensed dogs and intends to "crack down" on offenders. The new Oregon law code provides that any owner or keeper of a dog over eight months old for a period of more than 30 days must obtain a license for the animal. Judge Mahoney pointed out. Any person not complying with the law is guilty of misdemeanor, he said, and is liable to a fine of \$10 and costs.

Deadline for obtaining 1941 dog licenses was March 1. Penalty after that date is \$1, according to the county clerk's office. Licenses were \$1.50 for male and spayed female dogs, \$2.50 for females. February 28, the last day before penalties were to be invoked, county clerk's office workers were kept busy filling applications for over 1100 licenses.

Finances Good

Semon, who was vice chairman of ways and means in the house, said that the financial prospects for the biennium are substantially good. While there is an apparent deficit of \$500,000, he said, it appears quite certain that increased revenues from inheritance and gift taxes in the biennium will balance the program by the end of the period.

In the future, he warned, the state will find it more difficult to balance its budget without getting a added revenue from some source.

Speaking about the difficult problem of the state insane hospital, he said the legislature made progress on this matter by providing for a new \$325,000 for the hospital, and \$130,000 more for working conditions at the institution.

Agricultural legislation at this session, Semon said, was not of great consequence.

Satisfaction

Boivin expressed satisfaction over the legislation on vocational education, both he and Semon being sponsors of the vocational education bill which passed.

Boivin said he believes Klamath Falls has a good chance to obtain one of the regional schools in vocational education to be set up as a result of the legislation.

"Looking back over the session," said Boivin, a veteran of the Salem assemblies, "it is clear that it avoided legislation that would be harmful to the state. A lot of bills were killed. In many ways, constructive action was taken."

The legislative delegates said that action on the unemployment compensation questions, biggest issue of the session, in general benefited labor, protected the unemployment compensation funds and at the same time avoided any serious injury to industry in this area.

Boivin was appointed on the emergency board which handles the emergency fund in the interim between legislative sessions.

Materials were donated by local firms or purchased by the Red Cross.

While the men were building the house the women cooked a meal for the workmen and planned sewing bees for the Kasper family, which includes nine children ranging from three to

11 years old with two sets of twins.

The house was half completed by sundown and the men continued to work on the job this week while the local Methodist women collected furniture, cooking utensils and dishes.

Two sewing bees were held Monday, one at the home of Mrs. Noel Turner and one at the home of Mrs. Leon E. Judd.

Those who did the cooking at the "house-raising" Sunday were Mrs. Arthur Millard, Mrs. Ted G. Highley, Mrs. Alex Tilton, Mrs. Sid Elliott, Mrs. Marshall Farmer and Mrs. Howard Boyd, executive secretary of the Klamath County Red Cross. When the food was served the event ended in a general community picnic.

NEW PANEL CALLED FOR BAILEY TRIAL

President's Hat Brings \$3200 at Actors' Auction

HOLLYWOOD, March 18 (AP)—How much would you pay for a second hand hat of President Roosevelt?

Edward G. Robinson, who collects paintings in private life and plays "Little Caesar" and kindred tough guys in pictures, paid \$3200 for one last night.

Then he split the bill with Actor Melvyn Douglas. How they propose to share the hat was not made clear.

Robinson won the prize—the president's famed campaign hat which he gave Jean Hersholt recently, commenting "I won't be this again"—after spirited bidding at the "Gambol of the Stars."

The auction was conducted by President Edward Arnold of the Screen Actors' Guild and President Ken Carpenter of the American Federation of Radio Artists. The \$3200 will be contributed to the guild's motion picture relief fund, to care for the industry's own.

Drawing Rooms, Laundry Rooms Equal in Draft

By The Associated Press LONDON, March 18—Labor Minister Ernest Bevin, who holds almost absolute power over the lives of Britain's working men and women, declared Monday that registration of women for the labor draft would apply equally to drawing rooms and laundry rooms.

The only exemptions, the bulky, dynamic labor minister told a press conference, will be for girls already serving as auxiliaries in the armed auxiliaries and nursing services.

He announced by radio yesterday that April 5 has been set for the nation's first registration of civilians for war industry. Men 41 and 42 years old who are not employed in certain industries will be the first called, he said.

The national registration of women, he also announced, will begin April 19. Girls 20 years old will be the first group called and 21-year-olds will be enrolled soon after.

Bevin explained that the government would select from the list all women "likely to be useful to the war effort, whether in employment or not."

Once a bellhop and milkman himself, the labor ministry hates compulsion and believes volunteers are better workers than conscripts.

"I am satisfied," he concluded his radio appeal yesterday, "that this great democracy will submit itself to discipline and demonstrate its ability and a determination that will far transcend anything Hitler or his nazi regime can bring against us."

He stressed especially need for workers in shipbuilding and marine engineering and an urgent demand for volunteers in industry.

GETS CLOTHES

BERLIN, March 18 (AP)—Richard C. Hottel, American correspondent who was arrested last Saturday, was permitted today to receive a suitcase of his clothing and personal necessities. He is held on what DNB (German news agency) said were charges of "suspicion of espionage."

Knudsen Visions Big Increase of U. S. Industry

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—William S. Knudsen, defense production chief, disclosed Monday that the seven billion dollar British aid program plus defense contracts yet to be awarded would require a 60 per cent increase in American industrial activity.

Knudsen, director of the office of production management, Sidney Hillman, associate director, Secretary Perkins and other government officials addressed a conference called to consider how to increase the number of trained workers in the vital metal trades industry.

Opening the meeting, Knudsen reported that defense contracts let from the beginning of the emergency program last June to date called for 18,000,000 man hours of industrial production.

"We've got to go into production," Knudsen asserted, "on a scale in America that has never been even approached before."

Knudsen introduced Hillman, who asserted that "we here under our democratic institutions can do the job much better in the long run than it is being done in other countries where the totalitarian governments are in power."

With regard specifically to the training of workers Knudsen said that "last June there were many people who still thought in terms of unemployment" but that the conditions which resulted in such thinking were no longer true.

Participating with Everett in the blackout will be Marysville, Snohomish, Monroe, Sultan, Lowell, Plinehurst, Beverly Park, Beverly Hills and other Everett suburbs.

FIRST RAID

CHUNGKING, March 18 (AP)—Japanese planes raided this Chinese capital today for the first time in almost five months. Bombs fell in the western suburbs, but observers said they caused only slight damage.
