

FARMERS MUST VIE WITH WPA, SAYS PIERCE

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Rep. Pierce (D-Ore.) expressed the hope that it would be unnecessary for congress to enact legislation to cope with problems of farm labor shortage in agricultural areas where many men capable of seasonal farm work are employed on WPA projects.

Pierce wrote E. J. Griffith, Oregon state WPA administrator at Portland, that many farmers in eastern Oregon "find themselves actually in competition with the WPA" and had "asked for legislation to help them."

He said he was informed that "there is a great scarcity of farm labor throughout eastern Oregon," that circulars from the state employment service "indicate that this is the condition throughout the state and that it promises to become really serious during the farming and harvesting season this year."

"Farm prices are low," Pierce continued. "Farm wages are relatively high. Producers are in a difficult position. They claim that the government is acting in a manner which will close out the small farmers, who will be thrown on relief."

"It appears that the first victims of the defense program are the farm producers. Thousands of them have been obliged to abandon their farms because of the purchase of rich farm lands for army purposes. We are apparently approaching a chaotic and unfortunate condition in relation to the farmers."

Pierce called Griffith's attention to a resolution adopted by the Wasco county Pomona grange which urged the discontinuance "during the agricultural season, of all WPA projects except those vital to the national preparedness program."

He said the resolution pointed out that "orchardists in Wasco and Hood River counties are alarmed over the seasonable labor outlook," and added:

"It does not appear to me that legislation would be desirable if the problem can be worked out in some other way."

Pierce called attention to employment of young men, on vacation from school, during World War days, and said he thought "it would be a mistake for your organization or the youth administration to make artificial work programs for them (young men available for farm work) during the farm labor season."

RAILROAD NEWS

As a result of heavy traffic volume brought about by defense projects and general business improvement, Southern Pacific has raised the age limit by ten years on applicants for jobs as qualified mechanics, and will immediately augment its shop forces through the Pacific lines territory.

According to an announcement made today by George McCormick, general superintendent of motive power for the railroad, the age limit for such employment is now extended to cover applicants up to age 55. Previously the age limit was set at 45.

Men to be hired, McCormick said, must be qualified mechanics in any of the following classifications: machinists, boiler makers, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, pipe fitters, electricians and car mechanics.

Although the employment program will be general in all of the railroad's Pacific lines shops, it will be heaviest at principal shops located at Sacramento, Roseville, Oakland, San Francisco, Bakersfield and Los Angeles, California; Eugene and Brooklyn, Ore.; Sparks, Nev.; Ogden, Utah; Tucson, Ariz.; and El Paso, Tex., it was stated.

FERRARIS BUY 30 ACRES ON SOUTH SIXTH

One of the largest real estate deals consummated here in the past year is the sale of approximately 30 acres in the South Sixth street area to Frank and Art Ferrari.

This property was acquired from the Johnson and Webster interests of California, who once operated the White Pine mill in that location. The mill burned down a few years ago.

The property lies to the west of South Sixth street, adjoining the Modoc Gas and Oil company. Four hundred feet of spur track is already installed on the property, indicating the probability of considerable industrial and business development there.

The Ferraris plan to subdivide the tract, one of the largest open areas left in the immediate vicinity of Klamath Falls and in the line of the city's recent growth.
