NLRB INVESTIGATES KESTERSON BALLOT

An investigation Wednesday by Robert Davies, National Labor Relations board representative from Seattle, was under way into circumstances surrounding the board-ordered election to determine a bargaining agent for Kesterson Lumber company employees. An election was ordered in NLRB findings of a hearing held in Klamath Falls last month.

Arriving in the city at almost the same time was E. S. Neal, NLRB examiner from San Francisco, who will conduct an election Thursday, March 20, at the Tionesta mill of the Shaw Lumber company. Neal will also investigate a recent charge filed by the Klamath AFL claiming unfair labor practices in Weed and Dorris mills.

Russian Envoy
There was an unconfirmed report here that a special Russian envoy had arrived from Moscow to discuss foreign policy with Yugoslav leaders, but official quarters said no Russian had been received recently and the soviet legation denied the story.

A dispatch passed by military censor at Athens said the governors of Turkish and Grecian Thrace met at Karagatch, a railway station near Adrianople at the eastern end of the Bulgarian-Greek frontier.

Not more than 100 miles separates nazis forces poised north of that frontier from recently landed British troops who are reported moving north through Greece.

A German source in Belgrade suggested several reasons why the nazis army in Bulgaria has not struck already—or might not soon do so.

They included:
Three months were necessary to consolidate the German position in Rumania, so it might be expected several more weeks would be required to prepare for a major move south from Bulgaria.

The Germans might be waiting intentionally until Britain increased her expeditionary army in Greece "to make its defeat the greatest possible blow to the empire's armed strength."

Witness Stories Differ on Cafe Robbery-Slaying

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the bandits wore a denim jacket. Officers have in their possession a brown overcoat, evidently discarded by one of the bandits after the shooting of Dr. Salem A. David at the rear of the cafe, when the South Sixth street chiropractor pursued the marauders into the open following the robbery. The investigators are inclined to the theory of the brown and tweed overcoats because of this find.

Masks Studied
It was learned Wednesday also that one of the bandits assertedly dropped his mask while in the cafe, although not all witnesses agree as to this detail. The men wore blue bandanna handkerchiefs, and one such handkerchief was found with the discarded coat beside the cafe after the robbery.

The authorities said they are sure all witnesses were giving their stories as they had seen the events of the night, but that in the excitement varying impressions were obtained by those in the cafe.

Parted at Door
In general, the story of the actions of the bandits has been that they parted when leaving the cafe front door after the robbery, one going to the left and the other to the right. The one going to the right encountered first Mrs. Mary Warren, proprietress of the Buffalo, and then

fled down a driveway with Dr. David in close pursuit. The chiropractor caught up at the rear of the building and had the bandit on the ground when the other robber came up from the other side of the building and killed David with a blast from a shotgun.

It was learned Wednesday, however, that a witness has told officers that he saw a man run from the front or side of the Buffalo lunch and get on the running board of an automobile. The car then proceeded south on South Sixth street.

One man who said he saw the pistol bandit struggling with Mrs. Warren at the corner of the cafe estimated the bandit's height at less than that of the cafe proprietress.

In taking statements from witnesses, officers have learned that Dr. David, who was tending bar when the bandits entered the lunch room, undertook to argue with the bandits and to talk them out of taking money from the place. He told them that Mrs. Warren had relatives in the hospital and could not afford the loss of the money.

The bandits paid no heed to this and took \$70 from one cash register. They were unable to get the cash drawer open on a register behind the opposite counter.

Reports continued to circulate, despite any support from official quarters, that Singapore, Britain's great naval base in the Orient, would be available to the United States fleet if Japan should move southward.

At present, only the barest skeleton of a British naval squadron is stationed at Singapore. Australian air forces, however, are being increased steadily.

Similarly, the Netherlands East Indies lacks capital ships and would depend mainly upon submarines and fast torpedo boats for resistance against any naval attack.

Observers here say that, as a result, they believe the United States fleet will undertake "the heavy work," if Japan moves the main body of her capital ships against Singapore, or the East Indies, and the United States enters the conflict.
