system and electric power lines and that it had been "going on for several months."

"Know Their Business"

An unnamed officer at the fort was quoted as saying that the sabotage "is the work of men who know their business."

"We have proof of numerous sabotage efforts," the officer was quoted. "They have been largely unsuccessful. Yet they potentially have been a menace to an important part of the building and training program here."

Roofs Weakened

"Four-by-four uprights in barracks have been sawed through so that they would collapse under heavy snowfall or strong wind. Spikes have been driven through electric cables in an apparent effort to cause short circuits and start fires. Telephone lines have been spiked and cement pillars weakened."

"These do not appear to be the acts of a man or men with a grudge," the paper quoted the officer. "They give every sign of being real sabotage. They have been done skillfully and only luck has prevented serious consequences."

Federal bureau of investigation officials here said they had not been informed of the reported sabotage attempts.

The News-Post also reported the sabotage attempts had been admitted by Fort Mead authorities.

desire to consolidate national security and live at peace with the world."

"Unmistakably Friendly"—Members of parliament arrived by special train from Canberra yesterday after acting Prime Minister Fadden moved special adjournment as recognition of "unmistakably a friendly neighbor."

He praised President Roosevelt as one "who imbued the lease-lend bill with life and spirit" and spoke of the measure as a document "as vital to us and our children as Magna Carta or as the bill of rights to the citizens of America."

Fadden later announced the squadron would visit Brisbane for three days. Besides the heavy cruiser Chicago, the cruiser Portland, fleet leader Clark and destroyers Reid, Cassin, Conynham and Downes are included in the training cruise.

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, March 20 (AP)—Showered with gifts from the city and private organizations, six visiting United States warships left Auckland for an undisclosed destination today.

The flagship of the visiting group, the light cruiser Brooklyn, flew Maori and New Zealand flags in addition to the stars and stripes.

The gifts included 500 lamb carcasses and 1000 cases of apples.

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public shelter hit by a bomb.

In other outstanding examples of destruction, heavy bombs split buildings in two and a police station was blasted apart, killing several policemen on duty.

In many sections persons still were trapped in debris in mid-morning.

At one point a bus driver formed his passengers into a volunteer fire brigade and they quickly extinguished 50 fire bombs which sizzled into the street near the vehicle.

An intense barrage, which some observers said was the heaviest of the air war, greeted the Nazi raiders, but only one was reported shot down.

LONDON, Thursday, March 20 (UP)—The capital last night underwent its worst bombing of 1941 when hundreds of German planes bucked through one of the hottest defense barrages of the war and blasted the metropolitan area for hours.

Britain's strengthened defenses, which claimed a record number of raiders last week during the "battle of the full moon," scored again. At least four bombers were reported shot down by anti-aircraft batteries and night fighter planes.

London was under attack from early evening until past midnight. Tentative reports indicated that the raiders concentrated virtually their full strength on the capital, leaving the rest of the country at peace.

Deadly hail of high explosives and incendiaries pelted a wide area, but the suburbs appeared to have been hit the hardest. Many fires broke out, but most of them were snuffed out quickly.

The attack assumed the proportions of the air-blitz last autumn.

The dark waves of bombers roared up the Thames estuary soon after dark, dropping flares. The following planes scattered incendiaries, and when the bombers had their flickering targets to aid them went to work with the explosives.

The bombers were overhead constantly, but the drone of their motors often was drowned out by a barrage which surged to a new peak of intensity.

Hospitals were busier than they had been in months. The most savage attack seemed to be centered on those districts which suffered in the early days of the blitz.

Four bombs straddled and struck an eight-story apartment building, housing 400 persons, including many refugees from other areas. Some of the occupants were killed, others trapped.

Fifty incendiaries blazed up

on a road. A bus halted and the passengers tumbled out and doused the blazes.

Six hospitals were reported hit. One hospital wing was set on fire and the patients were evacuated to a neighboring hospital. An animal hospital was hit, trapping dogs and cats.

In one district several houses were wrecked and a number of families buried in the debris. Twenty victims were extricated, but others were believed buried.

British Drive Cheren Siege

CAIRO, Egypt, March 20 (AP)—With the RAF dive-bombing and machine-gunning Italian hill positions, British land forces are driving forward in their siege of Cheren, Eritrean key city, "in spite of heavy enemy counter-attacks," it was announced officially today.

"During yesterday's fighting the Italian casualties were particularly heavy," a GHQ war bulletin said.

The high command said that in southern Ethiopia "our forward movement is continuing satisfactorily."

It added that at recaptured Berbera, capital of British Somaliland, six guns and more than 200 Italian prisoners, including 13 officers, had been taken.

A dive-bombing, machine-gunning assault on Italian positions in the hills around Cheren, Eritrea's key city, was reported by the British royal air force. Shipping at Tripoli, capital of Libya in North Africa, also was heavily attacked, the RAF said.

arms in Yugoslavia, which has been dickered over German demands that she join the Rome-Berlin axis.

The British forces were said to have begun arriving yesterday at Salonika, backdoor to the Balkans and likely first objective of any German thrust from Bulgaria.

This was understood to be the first appearance of British forces at Salonika, although disembarking of a force expected to total 300,000 men has been underway for several days at five ports in southern Greece.

Accounts of the landing of the troops at the Aegean port, along with vast supplies of gasoline, came from the Greek frontier town of Gevelia, Yugoslavia, as Berlin dispatches reaching Belgrade asserted that "the Greek question already had been settled."

These dispatches failed to say just what kind of a settlement had been made, but they added that "only a short time must elapse before this conflagration which threatened to engulf other Balkan states will be extinguished."

U. S. to Build Huge Warships

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—Naval experts in the house said today the next five battleships to be built under the two-ocean fleet program would be from 60,000 to 65,000-ton dreadnaughts—the world's largest.

Representative Maas (R-Minn.), senior minority member of the house naval committee, said he had been informed the super-battleships would be of 58,000 "treaty" tons but when fully armed and armored would displace approximately 65,000 tons.

Maas added that he understood the ships were among the seven for which the navy let contracts last Sept. 9.

The marble headstone was sent to police officers Thursday as a gift from Vern Drager of Salem, state liquor control commission member. Fitting ceremonies will be observed Friday in back of the city hall where all that remains of Mitzi was buried last December following an altercation between Mitzi and a car.
