A pictorial story of ponderosa pine was shown to lumbermen of the Klamath region Thursday night by the Denver and Rio Grande Western railway, which made the film to help sell the lumber products of this country in the middle west and east.

It was the first showing of the film here, and warm praise was accorded it by the large crowd present at a dinner given by the railroad at the Willard hotel dining room.

The picture shows timber stands in the western pine country, logging operations, cutting the timber up in the mills, planing, box factories, dry kilns, transportation facilities, and finally depicts various uses to which ponderosa pine lumber may be put after sale in the retail markets.

William Constans of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company was toastmaster at the dinner, after which Denver and Rio Grande Western officials took over.

Legionnaires to
Skip Army Day
Parade in N. Y.

NEW YORK, March 21 (AP)—New York's American Legionnaires, for the first time in 24 years, don't intend to participate in the Army day parade April 5 commemorating America's entry into the World War, because...

"I wonder if you realize that by your attitude of limiting the space of the American Legion to 108 yards, you are serving notice to those young men marching in the army of the future that the memory of sacrifice and contribution to the perpetuation of a nation will be limited to not more than 23 years?"

Amebic Dysentery Carried
In Bad Water, Says Davis

Due to the large quantity of food grown on irrigated land in this community, the health department feels that it is important that the water used for irrigation be clean.

It is surprising the number of people who empty the effluent from their septic tanks directly into irrigation or drain ditches. Such practice is not only a menace to the health of the community, but a fraudulent violation of the law. Such practice leads to such diseases as typhoid fever, amebic dysentery and other filth diseases.

Amebic dysentery has been considered a tropical disease, but while it is more prevalent there, we now know that it may occur wherever there are carriers of E. histolytica. During, and just after the World War, numerous surveys demonstrated a surprisingly large number of carriers of the amebae of dysentery, occurs in persons who have never been in the tropics; in fact, the disease is widespread throughout the temperate zone and has been reported as far north as Alaska.

Water is most instrumental in the spread of the disease by carrying the feces containing the cysts (the infective stage) of the organism. Evidence of water-borne infection is seen in the comparatively small number of cases of amebic dysentery during the dry months in India and the increase immediately following the onset of the monsoon season of heavy rains. In Panama, the disease decreased markedly with a good water supply and other sanitary improvement. The Chicago epidemic of 1933 was traced to water. Cysts may live in water three or four weeks. Lettuce and other fresh vegetables, especially from soil fertilized with human feces or from contamin-

ated water used for irrigation, may be contaminated.

The prevention of amebic dysentery is a problem of biologic cleanliness. It can be prevented by the sort of sanitation and hygiene that prevents other filthy fecal infections.

The irrigation companies are now engaged in their spring ditch cleaning, and are reporting cases where effluent from septic tanks, or raw fecal matter is being emptied into their ditches.

If you are an offender, we urge you to correct the situation.

BOYS WARNED
NOT TO SHOOT
NEAR HOUSES

Sheriff Lloyd Low and County Juvenile Officer Spec Murray issued a joint warning Friday against careless rifle shooting in the thickly settled suburban districts.

The officers said they receive frequent complaints of dangerous shooting, and that several times bullets have been fired through the walls of houses.

On one occasion, such a bullet struck a woman in the back, but because the slug was spent no serious injury resulted.

The officers said that the law prohibits firing across the property of another or across a county road. Firing inside the city is prohibited by city ordinance.

In case some one is killed as a result of careless rifle shooting, the officers pointed out, manslaughter charges would probably follow. They urged that parents of boys with small calibre rifles see to it that these weapons are not fired in areas where there are people and houses.

A young naval ensign volunteered to police the information that he had taken her to a show Tuesday night but said he had heard nothing from her since.

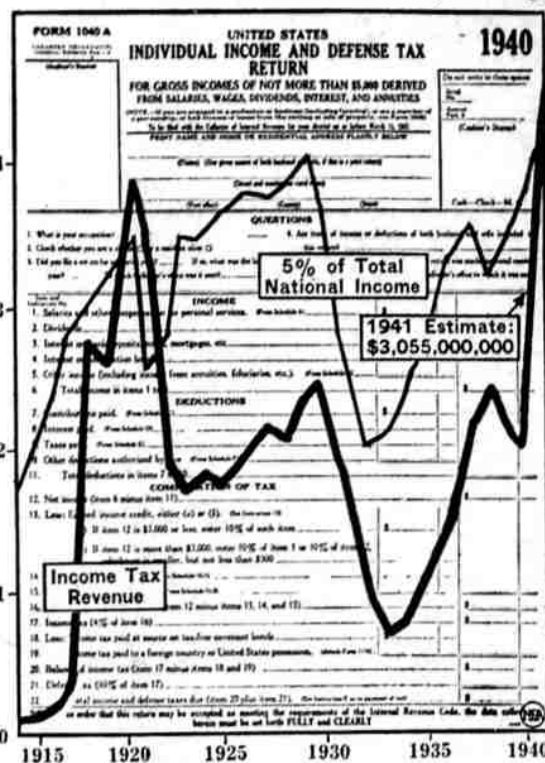
Friends said she had expressed dissatisfaction with the type of work assigned her, that she had hoped to be given stenographic work.

Income Tax Revenue on Upswing



After March 15 returns, and subsequent June 15 quarterly payments are counted, the U. S. expects its income tax revenue for fiscal 1941 (ending June 30) will be second only to the \$3,957,000,000 of 1920. Receipts for 1942 are estimated to reach a new high of \$4 1/2 billion dollars. Against background of an income tax blank are compared income tax receipts since 1914, when first returns were made, and graph line showing 5 per cent of the total national income for past 28 years.

Guardsmen to Demobilize
After Year, Says Official

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—A high army authority disclosed Thursday that, barring the gravest emergency, the war department had decided to demobilize national guard units upon completion of their year in federal service.

The same policy also will apply to the thousands of men who have been or are to be inducted into the army for a year's training under the selective service act.

Reports have circulated in recent weeks that the guard's tour of active service might be extended six months or even a year, in view of world conditions. It was understood that some national guard officials favored this lengthening of the training period.

The war department has been studying the question for some time, in regard both to guardmen and selective service trainees. Congressional approval would be necessary to extend the training periods, under existing circumstances.

The army's decision against requesting any extension in the service periods was because the primary purpose of the present peacetime defense preparations was to train as large a number of men as possible. Therefore, the land forces will be kept to their intended strength of 1,418,000 men by the induction of fresh selective service quotas and additional three-year enlistments in the regular army.

The full strength of 1,418,000 will be reached in June, according to present plans. The army then will be composed of about 500,000 regulars, 300,000 to 375,000 guardsmen and 600,000 or more selective service trainees.

National guard units, making up 18 divisions, will begin reaching the end of their year's service next September and in the ensuing six months all should be demobilized, unless circumstances dictate a new decision.
