

# REEVES TAKES S. P. POSITION FOR KLAMATH

C. H. Reeves, newly-appointed Southern Pacific freight and passenger agent in Klamath Falls, is making his first stand in Oregon despite nearly 25 years service with the S. P. and a total of 30 years of west coast railroad-

ing. Interviewed this week in his spare office in the Klamath Falls depot, the short, affable past commander of the Redding American Legion post said he liked his first views of the Klamath country and was looking forward to the famed southern Oregon fishing in coming summer months. Reeves broke into railroading in 1913 with the Santa Fe in New Mexico, then shifted to the Southern Pacific shortly before the war. After 18 months with the signal corps in which he saw action in six battles on French soil, he returned to California and a telegrapher's post on Southern Pacific's San Joaquin valley lines.

From there he has come up through the ranks and since 1936 has been general freight and passenger agent in Redding. Reeves last year was commander of Redding's American Legion post and just a few days before announcement of his promotion to Klamath Falls was elected a director of the Redding chamber of commerce.

Reeves has one son, a student in the Sacramento Junior college. The new Klamathite and his wife are living in the Roosevelt apartments on Pacific Terrace.

## Start Making Novel Bunny For Your Easter Table



Smiling bunny presides over the Easter table.

Even the budget homemaker wants a special decoration for the family's Easter dinner. It's not too early to begin to make a smiling white and pink bunny resting on a bed of lettuce leaves.

### EASTER BUNNY

With a compass draw a 3-inch circle on heavy white cardboard. Then draw an oval 8 inches long and 4 inches wide just below the circle with edges touching. Cut out circle and oval in one piece, forming the foundation for the head and body of the bunny. Pad both sides with tissue and wrap with a 1-inch strip of white crepe paper cut across the grain. For feet cut two cardboard ovals 1 1/2 inches wide and 4 inches long. Fasten two pieces of heavy No. 15 wire each 9 inches long to the top of each oval. Use gummed paper tape to hold in place. Then separate the wires and place bunny's body in between. Wrap with strip of white crepe paper to hold in place. Repeat with second foot. Continue padding and wrapping until bunny is completely formed. Then cover with white crepe paper which has been stretched and crushed between the fingers. The two front paws are made of tissue and covered with the white crushed crepe paper. Paste paws in place. Cut two ears 5 inches

deep and 1 1/2 inches wide out of double thickness of white crepe paper. Paste the two thicknesses together around the outer edge. Line one side with strip of Chinese pink paper. Also cut nose and mouth out of the pink crepe paper. For eyes cut a blue

Lawyer's seal in half and paste in place. The whiskers may be made out of three pieces of white spool wire each 6 inches long and inserted through the bunny's nose.

### LETTUCE

First cut lettuce leaf pattern out of plain wrapping paper. Make the leaf 11 inches deep, 8 inches wide through the center and 2 inches wide across the bottom. Round the corners at the top. Then cut six petals out of the yellow crepe paper, 8 petals

out of spring green or chartreuse and 8 out of summer green. Stretch and crush each petal across the top, then cup deeply through the center. Smooth out some of the crushing and group
